It is to be hoped that the management at Anyox will find a way of treating the concentrates locally so that the smelter there will again be operated to capacity.

Must Uphold Dignity Of Law.

The affair at Ocean Falls, where a member of the provincial police force was ill-used, is most regrettable. The dignity of the law must be upheld at all costs and it must be made clear that in this country men cannot abuse their privileges with impunity. If the report of the affair, as published in this paper yesterday, is a correct one, and we believe it is, the men who undertook to defy the law should be severely punished. Once it be understood that the law officers can be ill-treated with impunity, their influence is gone.

SYNOPSIS OF

PRE-EMPTIONS

Vacant unreserved, surveyed Crown lands may be pre-empted by British subjects over 18 years of age, and by aliens on declaring intention to become British subjects, conditional upon residence, occupation, and improvement for agricultural purposes.

Full information concerning regustions regarding pre-emptions is given in Bulletin No. 1, Land Series. "How to Pre-empt Land," copies of which can be obtained free of charge Aiyansh He prospected enroute by addressing the Department of Lands, Victoria, B.C., or to any Gov. ernment Agent.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes, and which is not timber A shipment of ore samples land, i.e., carrying over 5,000 board feet per acre west of the Coast Range and 8,000 feet per acre east of that

> Applications for pre-emptions are to be addressed to the Land Commissioner of the Land Recording Division, in which the land applied for is situated, and are made on printed forms, copies of which can be obtained from the Land Commissioner. Pre-emptions must be occupied for five years and improvements made to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivating at least five acres, before a Crown Grant can be

PURCHASE

Applications are received for purchase of vacant and unreserved Crown lands, not being timberland, for agricultural purposes; minimum price of first-class (arable) land is \$5 per acre, and second-class (grazing) land \$2.50 per acre. Further information regarding purchase or lease of Crown lands is given in Bulletin No. 10, Land Series, "Purchase and Lease of Crown Lands."

Mill, factory, or industrial sites on timber land, not exceeding 40 acres, may be purchased or leased, the conditions including payment of stumpage.

HOMESITE LEASES

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesites, conditional upon a dwelling being erected in the first year, title being obtainable after residence and improvement conditions are fulfilled and land has been surveyed.

LEASES

For grazing and industrial purposes areas not exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or company.

GRAZING

Under the Grazing Act the Prov-ince is divided into grazing districts and the range administered under a Grazing Commissioner. - Annual grazing permits are issued based on numbers ranged, priority being given to established owners. Stock-owners may form associations for range management. Free, or partially free, permits are available for settlers, campers and travellers, up to ter
