Mother of Mrs. J. W. Nicholls Was Frequent Visitor Here—Demise will be Regretted

The death occurred in Vancouver yesterday morning of Mrs. J. T. Phelan, wife of J. T. Phelan, superintendent of Government Telegraphs, and mother of Mrs. J. W. Nicholls of this city. Mrs. Nicholls received the distressing news by wire yesterday afternoon and will leave this afternoon for Vancouver.

The late Mrs. Phelan, who visited this city frequently, had many friends here and the regret at her demise will only be exceeded by the sympathy that will be extended Mrs. Nicholls in her sore bereavement. Mrs. Phelan underwent an operation a short time ago and since then had not been in good health.

FLOODS CAUSE MUCH DAMAGE BELLA COOLA

Bridge Washed Out and Settlers Isolated but No Loss of Life

Word has been received by the provincial police department that there have been floods in the Bella Coola valley commencing Sunday which washed out a number of the buildings and many of the settlers are isolated. The heavy rains of the past few days have been responsible for the condition.

One of the bridges is washed away and there is no way by which the settlers may reach the wharf.

Only a short time ago there was a flood which did much damage in the valley and at that time it was suggested that the village should be moved to the other side of the river to prevent isolation as the bridge is likely to be washed out at any time when the water rises.

No casualties have been reported and the isolated settlers are well supplied with food so far.

NEW PUBLICATION IN KETCHIKAN IS LIKELY

Plans Laid to Publish Alaska Fisherman at that Place from Big Plant

There is a scheme on foot to extend the scope of the present monthly journal "The Alaska Fisherman." The management has entered into an agreement to purchase the plant of the "Daily Alaskan" and to move it to Ketchikan and to publish there in a building of their own.

Efforts are now being made to raise money for the enterprise and a good many of the bonds are being taken up by the Alaska Nation Brotherhood, a native Indian organization. In case of liquidation it is agreed that the bonds taken by the Brotherhood shall be paid off last.

The prime mover in this is William L. Paul, an educated native, managing editor of the publication and candidate for representative in the Alaska legislature.

Paul is an associate of Dan Sutherland, John Rustgard, F. J. Hunt, and others all of whom believe in closer trade relations with Prince Rupert.
