Stone Coffin Sees First Light in 3,000 Years-Chastely Simple in Design

LUXOR, Feb. 5 .- For the first ime in three thousand years the great stone coffin of King Tutenkhamen, ancient monarch of the Exyptians, stood forth yesterday in all its majesty. Shorn of is protective golden shrine, the fourth easket proved chastely simple in design and as untouched by time as it is inviolate from the hands of tomb robbers. It is a specimen of the funerary art of the Eighteenth Dynasty. Four crowned goddesses of death stand at the four corners of the coffin with outspread wings to shield the dead monarch from evil forces. The figures are boldly and deeply incised.
