The starting point will be again on the Saskatchewan river at the Hudson Bay railway bridge, thence the route will follow along the Hudson Bay railway right-of-way as far, as mile "81" and there the teams! will turn into Herh Lake to the village of Herb Lake where the homeward turn will be made.
