## SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENTS

### PRE-EMPTIONS

Vacant, unreserved, surveyed Crown lands may be pre-empted by British subjects over 18 years of age, and by aliens on declaring intention to become British subjects, conditional upon residence, occupation, and improvement for agricultural purposes.

Full information concerning regulations regarding pre-emption is given in Bulletin No. 1, Land Series, "How to Pre-empt Land," copies of which can be obtained free of charge by addressing the Department of Lands, Victoria, B.C., or to any Government Agent.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes, and which is not timberland, i.e., carrying over 8,000 board feet per acre west of the Coast Range and 5,000 feet per acre east of that Range.

Applications for pre-emption are to be addressed to the Land Commissioner of the Land Recording Division, in which the land applied for is situated, and are made on printed forms, copies of which can be obtained from the Land Commissioner.

Pre-emption must be occupied for five years and improvements made to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivating at least five acres, before a Crown Grant can be received.

### PURCHASE

Applications are received for purchase of vacant and unreserved Crown lands, not being timberland, for agricultural purposes, minimum price for first-class (arable) land is \$5 per acre, and second-class (grazing) land \$2.50 per acre. Further information regarding purchase or lease of Crown lands is given in Bulletin No. 10, Land Series, "Purchase and Lease of Crown Lands."

Mill, factory, or industrial sites on timber land, not exceeding 40 acres, may be purchased or leased, the conditions including payment of stumpage.

### HOMESITE LEASES

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesites, conditional upon a dwelling being erected in the first year, title being obtainable after residence and improvement conditions are fulfilled and land has been surveyed.

### LEASES

For grazing and industrial purposes areas not exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or a company.

### GRAZING

Under the Grazing Act the Province is divided into grazing districts and the range administered under a Grazing Commissioner. Annual grazing permits are issued based on numbers ranged, priority being given to established owners. Stock-owners may form associations for range management. Free, or partly free, permits are available for settlers, campers and travellers, up to ten head.

## ONLY FEW CANNERIES ARE NOW OPERATING

Cohoos Still Being Caught on Skeena River and Chums at Islands

Adam Mackie, inspector of fisheries, returned last night on the Malaspina from a trip of inspection to the Rivers Inlet and central divisions of this district.

Mr. Mackie reports that there is only one cannery now operating in the Rivers Inlet district, this being the plant of the Standard Packing Co. at Goose Bay. It is packing cohoes and chums.

In the central division Namu and Bella Bella canneries are still in operation, their present packs being almost entirely chums. Butedale and Lowe Inlet canneries are closed. The run of chums is practically over and seine fishermen are getting small catches. In point of quantity, the pack in the central division this year is especially good and the total will exceed last year's. The pack of pinks has not been so large as in 1923 but the chum pack will be considerably in excess.

On the Skeena River a number of gill net fishermen are still engaged in catching cohoes. Three canneries are still running—Sunnyside, Inverness and the Millard cannery at Prince Rupert. All other plants are closed and, in many cases, the crews have gone south.

On the Naas River, the Somerville cannery is the only plant still operating.

An improvement early last week in the chum run on the Queen Charlotte Islands fell off towards the end of the week. Lagoon Bay and Lockport canneries are still running.

## SAYS DIAMONDS CANNOT BE MADE

Scientists Not Having Much Success in Attempts Manufacture Precious Stones

For over twenty years Sir Charles Parsons, famous as the inventor of the turbine engine, has been seeking to solve the mystery of the origin of the diamond, and recently he confessed at a meeting of the Royal Microscopical Society in England, that after spending thousands of pounds in his search for a solution he had been forced to the conclusion that the manufacture of artificial diamonds was impossible.

In the last fifty years many eminent scientists have tried to make diamonds in the laboratory, and some have claimed to have succeeded. The late Sir William Crookes, in language anyone could understand, gave the apparently simple formula for manufacturing diamonds when he said that the process consisted simply of dissolving charcoal (for a diamond is just charcoal, or graphite) in a liquid, and waiting for the dissolved substance to separate into crystals by slow evaporation. The ultimate crystals would, he said, be true diamonds. Nature thus transforms carbon into diamonds by subjecting it to enormous pressure and temperature in the earth.

The French chemist, Henri Moissan, subjected carbon to temperatures around 3,600 deg. C., and pressures exceeding fifteen tons to the square inch, the carbon being enclosed in pure iron. The crucible containing the iron and carbon was then plunged into cold water, which had the effect of solidifying the iron, which enclosed the carbon
