# WOODROW WILSON BURIED TODAY IN CATHEDRAL UNITED STATES CAPITAL

# President Wilson Buried Today with Highest Honors Nation Could Bestow on one of Private Citizens

WASHINGTON, Feb. 6 .- Former President Woodrow Wilson was buried here this afternoon without martial display but with the highest honors a nation can bestow on a citizen. The final ceremony took place in Bethlehem chapel of the cathedral of Saint Peter and Saint Paul.

Sixty of the former president's oldest friends attended a service at his home and 4,500 took part in the service at the cathedral, the latter including President Coolidge, members of the cabinet, high officials of the army and navy. Congress adjourned in honor of the dead and in many states commerce and governmental activities rested during the time of the funeral. The funeral service was heard throughout the country by
