

Feature Hockey Matches to Commence on Monday

MEET SLOVAKIA FIRST

TORONTO, Jan. 25-(Canadian) Press .- Playing conditions will be rather strange to the Canadian (Granites) Hockey team, which will contest the Olympic Amateur Hockey Championship, at the 8th Olympiad, in Chamonix, France, between Jan. 25 and Feb. 5, in the opinion of W. A Hewitt, manager of the team and secretary of the Ontario Hockey Association, who is accompanying the Candian team to France. Mr. Hewill gave his advance impressions of the Canadian's prospects in the Star Weekly.

"The games will take place in the open air on natural ice in daylight in the morning and afternoon," Mr. Hewitt points out. The Canadians have been accustomed to playing closed rinks, on artificial ice, by electric light, in the late evening. However, none of the conditions is expected to Mandicap the Canadians, though some of the finesse of the game will be lost by the absence of the boards around the rink. The arge ice should give great opporunity for fast skating and clever tick handling with little chance for any heavy body work.


