RAILWAY WINS IN EXPROPRIATION CASE

Vendor of Property Gets Only \$4,000 Whereas He Was Offered \$7,000

WINNIPEG, Oct. 23. — Word was received here last night to the effect that the award had been made in the expropriation case of the Canadian National Railways versus Chagan at Fort William, Ont., by Judge McKay, the arbitrator. The case was one in which the railways sought to expropriate thirty acres of gravel land near Fort William, offering in its notice of expropriation \$4,000 as payment. Prior to the hearing, the railways offered without prejudice \$7,000 in settlement which, being rejected, was withdrawn and the case proceeded with. The hearing of a large number of witnesses including half a dozen experts in regard to the quality of gravel and a market for it, occupied three days of last week. The arbitrator today awarded the owner the original offer of \$4,000 made by the railways, the owner to pay all costs.
