WIDENING OF AMERICANS

Student at Oxford Tells of Impressions Gained in England

LONDON, July 9.—Oxford University has found a subject for heated discussion in a speech made recently by a Rhodes Scholar from the United States, W. C. Greene, of Rhode Island, a graduate of Brown University. Mr. Greene was replying to a toast proposed by Rudyard Kipling at the annual dinner at Oxford of the Rhodes Scholarship Trust.

"Oxford and Europe," said Mr. Greene, as reported in the Daily Mail, "have brought death to us of our dreams, our romance, and our hopes that here we find three years of life, of continuous strangeness and duty. Romance is dead in us, and the grey, unbeautiful buildings of Oxford have become just old-fashioned buildings, and oftentimes prisons both of the soul and body. Oxford has not been Elysium, nor has our experience of the continent."

"But two things have come to a good many of us. We have learned the plain, old-fashioned, prehistoric, antediluvian joy of just sitting down. We have come to see that idlers and idleness of the body are not terms of contempt."

Intense Reverence
"The prime minister of England represents to many of us the thing which Oxford has brought to us, rightly or wrongly. Here we have sat down frequently, sometimes with intense reverence, at the foot of the grizzled figure of history."

"We have come to see the need of the new attitude towards peoples, and people towards the state. We go home, many of us, with the secret hope that some day we may enter the politics of our own country and perhaps breathe in the slow amalgam of our nature, the recognition of

"We go home with some appreciation of duty and appreciation of human life. Some day, perhaps, some of us may amount to something if the life of idleness has not become too strong."
