## CIVILIZATION IN THE JUNGLE

**Yucatan Once Had City With Temples and Pyramids and Art Work**

WASHINGTON, July 17.—Excavation of Chichen Itza, the once brilliant capital of the lost Maya race, civilization of American aborigines that reared an amazing culture on this continent before the dawn of the Christian era and then disappeared, bequeathing to posterity a vast riddle of ruined temples and stately pyramids, has been begun under the direction of the Carnegie Institute of Washington.

### Mystery of Origin

An expedition sent into Yucatan, the site of the Mayas' greatest cultural achievement, early this spring, has sent back to the Institution here its first report of actual progress on the task of digging the ancient metropolis from its jungle covered grave in a genuine effort to solve the mystery of the origin of the people who built it.

Dr. Sylvanus G. Morley, associate of the Carnegie Institution in Middle American Archaeology, is head of the expedition, which reached Chichen Itza May 18. Since that time the excavators have devoted their unrestricted attention to uncovering a group of pyramids and temples in the very heart of the buried city, known as "The Court of the Thousand Columns."

### Carved Columns

Part of this has already been reclaimed, the excavators coming upon beautifully carved columns, whose numbers led to the name ascribed to the court above. In the course of their excavations the archaeologists, Dr. Morley wrote, found a great mosaic which had once graced the entrance to one of the temples in this court.

"Chichen Itza originally covered an immense extent," Dr. Morley wrote. "The civic and religious center containing the temples, palaces, pyramids, market places, ball courts, terraces, tombs and plazas alone covered an area two miles long by a mile wide. But beyond this in every

## IRISH SITUATION IS NOT VERY ENCOURAGING

Pugnacious Telegram Sent to Colonial Secretary by Secretary of De Valera

LONDON, July 17.—An announcement that the remaining Irish leaders who are now in prison for sedition and similar charges, including Eamon de Valera and Austin Slack, will be released this week, is arousing considerable speculation with regard to development in the Free State. Mr. Rutledge, secretary to De Valera, sent a pugnacious telegram to the Rt. Hon. J. H. Thomas, colonial secretary, following the latter's statement that the labor government would not countenance any steps to establish a republic in Ireland.

The coming by-election in County Mayo is generally regarded as an index of the political barometer. It is feared that the general business depression throughout the Free State may induce many wavering voters to vote for a republic. The number of bankruptcies and the distress throughout the congested districts of the west is positively appalling.

Labor is rapidly drifting towards the danger zone of extreme radicalism. The immense destruction which is the result of the civil war has aroused fears that British capital will not be available for investment in Irish enterprises. The Free State is taking steps to interest Germany in financing several large schemes of development, especially in connection with a great power scheme. The weakness and inexperience of the government is daily aggravating the situation.

## WHEATLEY TELLS OF BRITISH HOUSING BILL

Does Not Discourage Private Enterprise but Tends to Promote It

LONDON, July 17.—Hon. John Wheatley, minister of health in the British Labor government, in explaining the housing bill passed by the government, said the main object was to secure continuity in the building of working class houses. The essentials of the bill were a treaty with the building industry, a treaty with the local authorities, and a charter for the tenant. Parliament was asked to guarantee financial support for 15 years to enable the industry to expand its resources in men, materials, and finance, and to become once more what it ought to be, a pillar of the nation. The industry undertook to provide houses in certain numbers according to a definite program at reasonable prices. The basis of the agreement with the building industry was the production and delivery of working class houses.

The government, he said, were leaving the production of materials to private enterprise. Further than that, they proposed to use the machinery of the Trade Facilities Act to develop the production. Short of a system of nationalization, the government had done everything possible to ensure that the production in abundance of necessary materials would be realized. The public had a serious interest in seeing that prices and costs of housebuilding which would lead directly to an increase of rents did not take place, and he defined in detail the measures taken to secure that end. The proposals did not discourage private enterprise. They did more to promote it than any measure which had been before the House in recent times. His policy was to get houses.

## METHODISTS OBJECT TO ROYAL FAMILY'S INTEREST IN RACES

LONDON, July 17.—The royal family has been criticized by a section of their subjects because of the royal fondness for the race-course. While a part of the nation stands by to applaud the sporting instinct which brings their majesties to mingle with the thousands of Englishmen at the courses, the Primitive Methodist conference at Newcastle recently passed a resolution denouncing the liaison between Buckingham Palace and Newmarket. The resolution expressed the attitude of the conference as "viewing with grave concern and pain the increasing close association of royalty with the turf."

Members of the royal family were more personally referred to in the discussions which took place before the adoption of the resolution. The Prince of Wales is the most adventurous member of the royal family, came in for most of the unfriendly criticism, but even Queen Mary was criticized for lending her presence to the grandstand.

## TRADE OF ALASKA IS ON INCREASE

JUNEAU, July 17.—Totaling \$2,486,993, Alaska's export trade last month was almost \$200,000 larger than in June, 1923, and approximately \$1,000,000 more than June 1922, and \$1,500,000 larger than the same month in 1921, according to the monthly summary of export commerce issued by Collector of Customs John G. McBride.

The value of the products of the fisheries industry last month reached \$1,318,642, an unusually high figure for the month. Copper ore shipments were valued at \$884,312 and representing cargoes aggregating 6,314,241 lbs.
