Got \$10,000 by False Pretenses Says Court of Plausible Crook

He is now serving time in a United States prison for manipulating worthless cheques, after extensive operations in many states of the Union.

Freeman is well remembered by business men, veteran organizations, military authorities and police of many cities in Western &Canada, He came to Winnipeg I early in October, 1923, under the name of Kenneth MacLellan, V.C., M.C., D.S.O., bearing excellent references from former employers in England.

For a time after his arrival, Freeman spied out the land seeking such a position as would become a man with alleged distinguished military record. During this period he occasionally adopted the titles of Lieut.-Col. and affixed to his signature the King George at Spithead. military honors of foreign lands.

Commercial Traveller

So good an impression did the 'colonel' create that he was employed by several influential firms in Winnipeg as a commercial traveller to cover western territory. Prior to his departure to the district assigned him. Freeman attempted to obtain sums of money on the strength of his military standing. He also addressed several of the fraternal and local service organizations, but eventually was branded as a "fakir" by veteran bodies and military authorities.

City and provincial police endeavored to locate the masquerader, but he proved a "will-o'the wisp." Tidings of him came t various times from points all over Western Canada. He was known to have stayed at one of the leading hotels in Calgary, Alta., and maintaining his bogus rank, proceeded to the Pacific oast, adding additional victims to his list as he moved on.

The authorities stuck with determination and persistence to their task of investigation. was discovered that he had made his way into the United States, where it is said he continued his activities.

Met Waterloo

Finally he reached Buffalo, N.Y., and ultimately was arrested in that city on a charge of obtaining \$10,000 by false pretenses. Freeman was convicted and given an indeterminate sentence of three years in prison at Auburn, N.Y.
