Women Riot in Chicago During Garment Workers Strike as Shops Raided

CHICAGO, Feb. 28. - Sluggings, stabbings, rioting, and storming of shops marked the opening of the strike of the dressmakers' section of the International Garment Workers' Union yesterday. The employees walked out to try to enforce the demands for higher wages and shorter hours and unemployment

Strike sympathizers raided five establishments, which attempted to operate, and in the resultant encounter two employers were stabbed, two slugged and a score of girls were chased to the fire escape from whence they were rescued by the police with drawn pistols.

Many of the rioters were arrested.

McPhillips Withdraws from the Investigating Commission and Bowser and Sloan Deny Charges

VICTORIA, Feb. 28 .- The withdrawal of L. G. McPhillips, senior counsel for the Provincial Party from the proceedings, was the chief incident of today's session of the P.G.E. commission. Mr. McPhillips and other counsel of the Provincial Party regard the document which gave the commissioner instructions as too narrow to cover all charges. They hoped to inquire into campaign funds. Mr. Justice Galliher, however, held them down to the question whether Messrs. Bowser and Sloan got, \$50,000 or any other sum.

Both Bowser and Sloan testified yesterday afternoon that they had received no money
