## ESKIMOS MET DEATH WITHOUT ANY CONCERN

### Other Natives Took no Notice of Execution of Their Countrymen in North

EDMONTON, April 25.—The unconcern with which natives of the far north meet death, is emphasized in a letter received on Friday with the first batch of mail from the top of the map, by the Northern Trading Company here.

The manager of the N.T.C. at Aklavik writes regarding the execution of Aikomiak and Tatamagana at Herschel Island on February 9. The two men were held under close observation by the R.C.M.P. in the barracks of the Arctic Sea Island, awaiting execution, and everything proceeded according to the usages of the outside world.

On the day prior to that fixed for the execution the Eskimos were informed that their hour had arrived. They received the news with the utmost unconcern. They only evinced interest in the manner in which they were to die. When informed the execution was to take the form of hanging, they replied, "All right," and apparently gave the matter no further consideration.

The two natives were put to death in the old "bone house" of the American whalers, and everything went without hitch. The other natives in the vicinity went about their usual avocations of making garments and cooking without being in the least disturbed; there was no fuss of any kind, and a stranger on the island would not have been aware that the two men were paying the penalty of their crimes with their lives.

"The hanging was most successful—from the executioner's point of view, at least," said the Arctic letter writer.

## DUNWELL MINES TO SHIP IN AUTUMN

Announcement is made by R. M. Stewart, managing director of the Dunwell Mines, Ltd., which recently proved the extension of its high grade vein to a depth of 600 feet, that plans are being formulated to ship ore this fall on completion of the wagon road to the mine and to carry on continuously thereafter. In a bulletin to the shareholders Mr. Stewart states:

"A fair average of this ore body with a little sorting would be from \$125 to \$150 per ton, but taking the lower figure we can safely say that we have ores that when shipped will give us \$100 to the ton after all charges are paid. "As a basis for figuring and taking only ten tons per day, it will be at once seen that it can produce more than the entire capitalization of the company (\$350,000) each year and this tonnage can be increased to any extent found advisable.

"Keeping in mind that a mine should be put on a paying basis at the earliest possible moment the management are giving their greatest attention to this phase of the mine operation and the shipment of the high-grade ore should be able to take care of all development work, equipment and extensions, and provide for the shareholders at the same time."
