Coolidge Advocated an Extension of Effort to Limit all Armaments

Will Make Move to Bring About Another World Conference to Deal with it.

NEW YORK, April 23 .- President Coolidge at the annual luncheon of the Associated Press editors and publishers of the leading newspapers here yesterday made a speech which was broadcasted throughout the country. He promised to make an effort to bring about another world conference, to attempt further limitation of armaments including submarines, aircraft and land forces. Such efforts must, however, be predicted on a definite settlement of the German reparations question.
