G. MCILMOYLE IS CHAMPION

Final of Billiard Series was Most Closely Contested of Series—Score 1,000 to 993

A margin of seven out of one thousand points gave George McIlmoyle the individual city billiard championship over Sergeant Jebson and made the final of the competition played last night the most interesting and keenly contested of the entire series which has been in progress for the past three weeks. The score was 1000 to 993.

Sergeant Jebson emerged winner from the first session on Thursday night by a score of 500 to 472 after having led McIlmoyle practically all the way. The latter player started strong in the second session last night and was 80 ahead on two occasions. Jebson, continuing his consistently good play, managed to even up twice and the scores were tied at 865 and 990. The finish was a fitting and exciting climax.

McIlmoyle's high break was 57—the highest of the entire series—and Jebson's, 24. The average of the former was 3.87 and of the latter, 3.84.

McIlmoyle carries off three of the prizes for the competition—the cup for the winner, the cue for the player making the highest break and the prize for the highest average per innings—5.26. Sgt. Jebson gets a gold-medal for runner-up. The record time was made by Col. McMordie in his game with F. A. Aldridge—2 hours and three minutes.

A big crowd watched last night's game and excitement was tense. It was a much more closely contested match than had been expected. Both players were in good form with Jebson probably a little the steadier.

MALASPINA WON OVER CALLIES AT FOOTBALL

The condition of the grounds mitigated against the effectiveness of play on both sides but did not prevent several bursts of good soccer. Their first game of the season, the Callies were naturally out of practice.

FEAST OF INTELLECT AT ANYOX WHEN DR. WILLIAMS VISITED

Two Lectures Given by Professor From University of B.C. at Smelter Town

ANYOX, April 19.—During the past few days, the Anyox Community League, in conjunction with the Parent Teachers' Association, had the pleasure of entertaining Dr. M. Y. Williams, geologist, of the University of British Columbia, as well as listening to his lectures on two occasions. On Monday evening, Dr. Williams, lectured on "The Birds of British Columbia," showing about one hundred and twenty-five slides in illustrating his talk, which was enjoyed by a large and appreciative audience. On Wednesday night, Dr. Williams told of "Geologic Exploration in the Far North," tracing the work done by early explorers under the banner of the Hudson's Bay Company to the work of drilling for oil in the McKenzie River valley by the Imperial Oil Company, and incidentally telling of two seasons spent in that vast country as a member of a survey under the direction of the Geologic Survey of Canada.
