## Wonders of Jungle Brought to States by Explorer; Man Eating Sardine and House Building Toad

NEW YORK, July 26 .- (By Canadian Press) .- Aside from the "white" Indians brought back from the Panama jungles by the Richard O. Marsh expedition, scientists are investigating other zoological and botanical mysteries unearthed by the expedition. Among them is a frog that builds a house.

This queer frog, says Charles M. Breder Jr., of Newark, an icthyologist of the American Museum of Natural History, builds a dam in front of the hollow he has selected and when the water seeps through to make a lagoon he sits and chants a love song

him in his "apartment." Another species of frog was found that, withoits mate, kicked up a tremendous froth of water so that the bubbles covered the eggs and these were sealed with a viscous fluid.
