Proclamation Issued by Mayor and all Combine to Aid in Beautification

JUNEAU, May 12.—Formally launching the annual cleanup and paintup campaign which has been extended this year, Mayor L. Goldstein issued a proclamation calling on all local residents to combine in an effort to make Juneau a "more beautiful and cleaner city."

It is expected that all local civic organizations will co-operate with the municipal authorities in putting the work over. Vacant lots will be cleaned, unsightly structures placed in a neat condition and rubbish removed from the city limits. Weekly trips will be made by trucks of the City's street department throughout the town to haul off the accumulation of rubbish removed from private as well as public property. BRITISH POLICE WOMAN VISITING IN NEW YORK

Took Charge of Traffic For Short Time at Busy Corner of U.S. Metropolis

NEW YORK, May 13.—For a few hours recently there was a new officer in charge of traffic at 42nd St. and Lexington Avenue.

"A slim, bronzed figure in high boots, a dark blue coat reaching to the knees and a trim, gold-braided cap; on the chest was worn the Order of the British Empire." This was Commandant Mary S. Allen, head of the London Police-women. Speaking of the latter to a reporter, she said that the 20 London policewomen differ from those of American cities, in that they are always uniformed conspicuously. The sight of a woman police officer prevents many crimes, and prevention of crime, she says, rather than the capture of offenders, is the chief purpose of the women.

They began their work during the war, when they watched over the young women and soldiers who flocked through the great railroad stations. Since then their work has grown to taking charge of women prisoners, collecting testimony from women, protecting girls who are strangers in the city, taking charge of lost children and runaway girls, in-

specting places of amusement and patrolling parks. In addition, Commandant Allen visited the occupied area of Germany and established six British women there to assist the police.
