WILLS WINNER OF BIG FIGHT

Match Went Twelve Rounds Without Official Decision New York Yesterday

EVERY ROUND TO NEGRO

Body Blows Told on Argentine and in Second Round He Was Floored

NEW YORK, Sept. 12.—The newspapers gave the decision to Wills in the big fight last night at Boyles' Thirty Acre's Jersey City. They went the full twelve rounds in the no-decision match. According to the newspapermen present, Wills won practically every round and in the second round floored Firpo. Twice the colored man staggered the Argentine, who was weakening from kidney punches.

Firpo made great efforts to finish the game quickly with a knockout, but Wills, who seemed to be much the better boxer, ducked the swings and got in body blows that had their effect.

Record of Fighters

Only twice has Firpo felt the humiliating sting of a knockout since his meteoric career commenced. In 1917 he was laid low by an amateur, Angel Rodriguez, now retired from the ring. Then in 1923 the damaged right of Jack Dempsey was the propelling power that lowered his centre of gravity.

Wills has been knocked out but once. That was at the hands of Sam Langford in 1916, when the two Negroes fought nineteen rounds.

SKINNER FAILED TO FINISH BOUT

Referee Declares Match with Joe Manilla a draw—Knock out in One of Preliminaries

Brick Skinner seemed to have the best of things in the first round of the boxing bout with Joe Manilla of Ketchikan last night but he was not able to go through after receiving what he claimed was a foul and the scheduled 6-round battle ended one minute and forty seconds after the opening of the second round. It was a good battle while it lasted and a draw result was declared.

The two 3-round preliminaries—Benny Wendle vs. Ned Byrne and Dido Gurvich vs. Tommy Fraser—were draws but the third between Ernie Warren and Jim Flewin ended in thirty seconds

when the latter was knocked out. Charlie Gleason refereed the main event, P. Laporte the preliminaries and Max Heilbronner was timekeeper. The attendance well filled the Empress Theatre.

the most ardent soccer enthusiasts were out to witness the struggle.

The following teams were fielded:

Ocean Falls—Willier, goal; Lord and Smith, full backs; Barnes, Best and Keith, half backs; Paul, Clarke, Defieux, W. Smith and Mitchell, forwards.

Anoxo—Craggs, goal; Steward and Stellie, full backs; Bunton, Scott and Campbell, half backs; Dearlove, Carter, Robertson, Ingram and Jack forwards.

S. Elder refereed and F. Hardy, Prince Rupert and W. Johnson, Ocean Falls, ran the lines.

The first tally was made a few minutes from the kick-off by O. Defieux, at centre forward for Ocean Falls. Shortly afterwards Baker Robertson, equalized for the gas-eaters. The play was fast and considering the wretched nature of the ground and ball some good football was displayed.

Both teams were on their mettle and put forward their best efforts in spite of the adverse elements. Shortly before half time Clarke, in the forward line for the paper makers, beat Craggs for a second time with a difficult shot. Play was delayed for several minutes by an injury to Defieux, the Ocean Falls' centre forward, who accidentally collided with Craggs, when the latter ran out to clear a "skied" ball, and was forced to leave the field for medical attention. At half time the score stood 2-1 in favor of the southerners.

Second Half

In the second half Ocean Falls were unfortunately handicapped by the absence of their centre forward as a result of his injury.

However, the paper makers put up a very stubborn resistance. A persistent bombardment of the Ocean Falls' stronghold eventually gave Scott, in the Anoxo forward line, an opportunity and he kicked into Willier's hands.

The latter apparently passed the ball over the goal line. There was some dispute about the validity of the goal and talk about protesting the game by the Ocean Falls team. The goal was allowed by the referee, however.

After some hard work, which provided plenty of excitement in front of the Ocean Falls goal, Baker Robertson again scored for the smaller town. The final score was 3-2 in favor of Anoxo.
