Flames leaping for hundreds of feet in the air from the large frame buildings which were destroyed in the fire at Ketchikan Friday night made the conflagration visible for miles. So intense was the heat that it was uncomfortable for blocks around and almost impossible to approach nearby despite the fact that it was a very cold night with a bitter northwest wind blowing. Before fire fighting started the blaze had taken a good hold but, in spite of this and the other difficulties attending, the volunteer fire department of Ketchikan did yeoman service and it was only
