ISSUES STATEMENT

The Ukranian people of this city held a meeting yesterday and this morning issued the folowing appeal:

To the Organized Working People of the World.

We, the Ukrainian workers of Prince Rupert, assembled in a mass meeting, March 30, 1924, decided to protest before the masses of organized working people the world over against the cruel oppression of the Ukrainian peasants and workers of western Ukrainian territories now under the Polish and Roumanian occupational rule.

Ten million of Ukrainian peasants and workers of these territories groan in economic political and national bondage on their own land, forcibly occupied and annexed by Poland and Roumania. Peasants and workers are being ferrorized; mass executions are common occurences. In Eastern Galicia particularly. all prisons are filled with innocent Ukrainian peasan s, workers and those of the educated class. and these political prisoners are being kept together with common criminals for months, and even years, without any court hearing. As a result of an unbearable prison regime, political prisoners very often commit suicide.

Editors in Prison

Just recently the Polish authorities confiscated the Ukrainian newspapers. The editors and publishers of the gapers were arrested and are kept in prison.

On February 9, 1924, Olha! Besarabova, an intelligent krainian woman, was arrested and jailed as a polifical prisoner. Three days later, i.e., on February 12, she was brutally murdered in prison and secretly buried by the Polish police authorities, her brother, a college! teacher, and all her other relafives were not aware of her whereabouts and the police authurities refused to tell them of her death and disclose the place of her burial. However, this is only one of the tragic occurrences that are so commonunder the Polish rule.
