MASCOT OF CUTTER MOJAVE IS BURIED IN SEA FROM SHIP

HONOLULU, Jan. 10. - The United States coast guard cutter Mojave steamed into port recently ahead of her schedule. Immediately she docked, members of her crew got an automobile and rushed the ship's mascot, a dog named "Soup," to a veterinarian in an endeavor to save his life. But "Soup" had no chance to live, the doctor declared, and he was mercifully chloroformed. The next morning, with the flag at half mast, the Mojave steamed slowly out of the harbor to sea where, after a brief service, the remains were consigned to the deep.

"Soup" joined the Mojave at San Francisco and served aboard during the Alaskan tour of duty. He became ill shortly after the cutter was due here, and nothing that could be done seemed to help him. The commander was appealed to, and he gave permission to increase the speed of the ship to capacity in order, as soon as possible, to secure the services of a veterinarian.
