J. W. Nicholls Tells Rotarians of of Visit to United States and Eastern Canada

Interesting impressions of his trip through the United States and Canada were given to the Prince Rupert Rotary Club yesterday by J. W. Nicholls in which he told of some of the incidents of an extended tour. He visited all the important towns of Canada and many of the big cities of the United States.

In Winnipeg when going Mr. Nicholls found the greatest pessimism expressed but on his return, the promise of a good crop in Manitoba had changed the outlook somewhat and people were more hopeful. The farmers he found were the greatest optimists. He met all sorts and conditions of people and talked to them all.

Wonderful Change In Chicago, the most extreme optimism prevailed. A wonderful change had taken place there in two years. The biggest real esand apartment houses were going up, millions of dollars were being spent on parks and boulevards reclaimed from the lake.
