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## DEADLOCK OVER DAWES REPORT CONTINUES

### GYROS OPEN PLAYGROUND UNDER VERY FAVORABLE AUSPICES YESTERDAY

#### Deadlock Still Halts Allied Conference in London Dealing with Dawes Plan for Germany

LONDON, July 25. — Every effort to break the deadlock which halted the work of the inter-allied conference has been put forth to put the Dawes plan into effect but thus far without success. The conference stumbling block is a difference between Premier Herriot of France and British and American financiers over the sufficiency of guarantees which might accompany the proposed forty million pound loan to Germany.

The bankers insist that they are interested only in proper security for the loan and expect to draw up a formula embodying their outline before they approve the loan.

France maintains her original stand that she abide by the Treaty of Versailles and that in the event of wilful German defaults she have the right to impose sanctions no matter whether the other allies collaborated or not.

#### MIKE MANSON GETS RECOUNT

His Election Is Conceded by McKay in Mackenzie But Further Protest Will Be Made

VANCOUVER, July 25. — Election of Michael Manson, Conservative candidate in the election in the Mackenzie riding was conceded by council for McKay, Liberal, after the recount had progressed a short time in the county court yesterday.

It will be recalled that in the first count by the returning officer the Conservative was declared elected by 135 majority but the result was reversed as a result of the counting of the absentee votes, giving McKay a majority of seven.

McKay's counsel announced that an attempt will be made to reverse the finding of the county court in respect of certain ballots.

#### WINNIPEG WINS AT FOOTBALL

#### HOUSING BILL THIRD READING

LONDON, July 25. — The House of Commons today passed the third reading of the Government's Housing Bill after an opposition motion of rejection had been defeated by 226 to 131. The bill had been greatly altered in committee since it was introduced but the frame work remains.

Their Majesties took tea with a small number of guests including Secretary and Mrs. Hughes in the royal marquee, while the remainder of the guests were served in other pavilions. Later the King and Queen shook hands with all who desired.

Rain somewhat marred the event.

Most of the guests were Canadian and American lawyers.

#### CLAIM FOUL IN TUNNEY FIGHT

Confusion at Close of Big Bout Last Night When Carpenter Declared Beaten

BLOW SAID TO BE LOW

Supporters of Frenchman Cheered Him to Echo Last Night After Adverse Decision

NEW YORK, July 25. — The fight last night in which Gene Tunney defeated Georges Carpentier by a technical knockout, ended in confusion. A blow, which Carpentier's handlers said was low, at the end of the fourteenth round sent Carpentier to the mat writhing with pain but the referee refused to call the blow a foul and ordered Carpentier to continue.

When the bell sounded for the fifteenth round, Carpentier doubled up, attempted to renew the battle in a semi-crouched position. The referee waved Tunney to his corner and Carpentier rolled over on the floor.

At the ringside there was a bedlam of confusion. Deschamps, Carpentier's manager, rushed to the referee yelling "Foul." The referee waved him away while the announcer lifted Tunney's arm in token of victory.

Many spectators thought the blow which laid Carpentier low was a foul and booed the decision of the referee. They cheered Carpentier to the echo and assisted him through the ropes.

#### RADIO STATION AT VANCOUVER

New Short Wave Installation to be Made by Marconi Company There and Montreal

OTTAWA, July 25. — Radio stations are to be established near Vancouver and Montreal as links in the Empire wireless program as a result of arrangements just completed between the British government and affiliated Marconi companies. They are to be short wave or "beam" stations and will be owned and operated by the Marconi Company of Canada. They will have a speed of 100 words a minute and will cost approximately \$300,000 each. Work on the erection of the stations will be proceeded with promptly.
