

IN THE CAPITALS OF CANADA

THE year 1867, when the foundations of modern Canada were laid by Confederation, was the year in which the Bank of Montreal celebrated the 50th anniversary of its foundation. By that time the Bank was already a strong and stable institution, with Branches well distributed throughout Upper and Lower Canada.

Established in Montreal in 1817, the Bank opened an Office in Quebec in the same year, in York (now Toronto) in 1818, in Ottawa in 1842, in Halifax in 1868, in Winnipeg in 1878, in Regina in 1882, in Victoria in 1891, in Fredericton in 1899, in Edmonton in 1903, and in Charlottetown in 1907.

Today the Bank has more than 550 Branches in Canada and offices in New York, Chicago, San Francisco, Spokane, London, Paris and Mexico.

MURDER TRIAL IS DELAYED

Navigation Not Being Open in Arctic Causes Difficulty in Getting Witnesses.

FORT McMURRAY, July 25.—The Eskimo murder trial at Aklavik, on the delta of the Mackenzie River, has been postponed indefinitely, because of weather conditions in the Arctic, and when Judge Dubuc and the judicial party will return to the "outside" is a matter of conjecture—perhaps next week, perhaps next month!

Navigation is not yet open in the Arctic Ocean, and as a consequence the Mounted Police patrol boat cannot get around the coast from Coronation gulf to Aklavik with the witnesses necessary to the trial, and so the judge and his court with the Eskimo prisoner must wait at Aklavik until better weather permits water travel.

Has Been Held a Year.

Last year, because of the presence of ice in the Arctic for the entire summer, navigation was difficult and dangerous, and for this reason the prisoner now at Aklavik reached Herschel Island too late for last year's trial (when two of the natives were sentenced to death and hanged) and had to be held by the northern detachment of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police a year.

Two years ago no vessels were able to get beyond Herschel Island, because of the ice; all the traders in the eastern Arctic were unable to communicate with the island and the entire trade of the Far North was tied up. There is a possibility that the same thing may occur this year, and for these reasons the trial and the return of the judicial party is uncertain.

FAMOUS ALASKAN INDIAN CHIEF DEAD

JUNEAU, July 25.—Katllean, Chief of the Sitka tribe, one of the historic Indians of Alaska, died at his home last Saturday, according to advices received here. His age was unknown, he himself claiming to be more than 100 years old, but he is known to have been the oldest resident of Sitka. With his death the last surviving member of the older generation passed away.

"The name 'Katllean' is one well known in this community and belongs to the chief of the Sitka people. In 1799 the grand uncle of the deceased is mentioned, by the name of 'Katllean,' and made a treaty with the Russians under Baranoff who settled old Sitka.

Appointed Chief

"Katllean was a man of striking personality and character. In his earlier years he was feared because of his power and influence. In later life, however, he cast his influence on the side of law and good government, both among his own people and in general. In 1880 he was appointed chief of native police, by Captain Glass, Commandant of the U. S. Jamestown, and made many trips on that boat to outlying communities to enforce law and order. He was reappointed to this office by Governor Swineford and later by Governor Brady. Katllean and Anahoolz were commissioned to keep peace among the natives. Under Governor Swineford he was deputized to destroy the traffic in and use of intoxicating liquors among the native people and was always brave and fearless in the discharge of his duty.

"Katllean was always a leader in good works. His influence was always for right living and forward steps among his own people. When the Alaska Native Brotherhood was started in Sitka he donated the site upon which the hall was erected, ground in front of his house. He exerted his influence to persuade the older people to join the brotherhood.

"He was converted under the preaching of Rev. Mr. Austin, in 1900, becoming a member of the Presbyterian Church, and remained a faithful Christian up to the time of his death. For a number of years he was a deacon in the church. Realizing that the end was near he sent for Dr. Condit as representing the faith of his choice and requested that he administer the word of God to him. He also requested that he be buried from the church where

he made profession of his faith in Christ. He died in the faith with full confidence of life everlasting through Jesus Christ."

He was buried at Sitka Sunday.

PILOTS RACE FOR BUSINESS

Two New Speed Boats Being Built By Rival Firms On Southern B. C.

VICTORIA, July 22.—Keen rivalry that has existed between the B. C. pilots, independent pilots and the Vancouver pilots will likely be more intense when two new speedboats, being constructed for the B. C. pilots and the Vancouver pilots are launched next week.

Both vessels will cost approximately \$6,000. Although both speedboats are of altogether different types there is a similarity between the hulls.

Both are of the modified V design. The Cuckoo, the Vancouver pilot's new boat, although carrying the modified V hull feature also has the Hand type hull incorporated. The stern of both vessels are of the runaway type, while the draft of the two boats are about the same. Only three feet of water is drawn by both boats.

The B. C. pilot boat is 45 feet long with a 9-foot beam and approximately 10 tons weight.

A six-cylinder 300-horse power aero-marine engine has been installed.

The fuel tanks will carry 300 gallons of gasoline.

With an engine of 150-horse power the Cuckoo is expected to average at least 20 knots an hour.

The Cuckoo has been so lightly constructed that it was considered unwise to install a more powerful engine.

The Cuckoo is forty feet in length, with a nine-foot beam and a minimum two and a half-foot draft. She is much lighter than the other craft, being of eight tons gross.
