**PROGRESS BY FAIR BOARD**

Meeting Last Night Hears Cheering Committee Accounts Of Work Proceeding.

A special general meeting of the Fair Board took place in the City Hall, last night, Joe Greer, president, in the chair. Members of the board present included Ben Self, Frank Dibb, Dan Jabour, Geo. Kerr, Alderman Perry, Fred Scadden and D. McD. Hunter, secretary.

The meeting was called for the purpose of giving the various committees an opportunity to report the present condition of the various undertakings in connection with the staging of the exhibition in September.

**Committees Report.**

Ben Self, chairman of the sports and attractions committee, outlined the designs of the committee with reference to the putting on of the Carnival Queen contest. It was decided that the capital prize to be offered would be a free trip to the Wembley exhibition, London. The selection of the district prizes has yet to be made. He also reported that the committee were arranging for a special sports program during fair week, in which the co-operation of Anyox and Ocean Falls teams had been assured.

Ald. Perry reported for the building and grounds committee, and outlined the work done in the matter of lowering the floor for the tea room and the putting in of an experimental archway underneath a portion of the balcony. The board decided to have the entire pit of the building surrounded by smaller arches. Instructions were left with the committee to have these arches completed and also painted.

The secretary reported that almost all the outside concession booths have been let and a considerable number of the inside booths.

Frank Dibb, chairman of the finance committee, outlined the proposed method of raising the necessary funds for the successful carrying out of the exhibition.

**Judges.**

The matter of judges to act at the forthcoming exhibition has been taken up with the department of agriculture by the secretary. Stanley Dorrell, of Vancouver, an experienced dog fancier and judge of kennel shows at many of the larger centers has been engaged to act in the capacity of judge of the dog show.

The president reported that the advertising committee was keeping pace with the publicity campaign. R. E. Benson, manager of the carnival queen contest reported that he was making necessary arrangements for printed matter in connection with the carnival.

Correspondence received by the board from outside centres indicates an enthusiastic feeling in the interior and surrounding districts.

Escape From C.G.M. Boat at Victoria and Cannot be Found; Were Handcuffed Together

VICTORIA, July 25. — Every nook and cranny of the waterfront has been diligently searched for the two venturesome Glasgowers who escaped, handcuffed together, from a forward locker of the C.G.M.M. vessel, Canadian Importer, at Ogden Point Thursday morning, after a free ride from Montreal; but the waterfront has been found as bare of evidence of their presence as Admiral Field's quarterdeck was found to be innocent of dust when the Hood berthed at Ogden Point.
