Taste in Cheese Shows Variety

OTTAWA (CP)—How do you like your cheese? Most people in Ottawa like theirs on the mild side. People in Vancouver favor medium-strength cheese. Most Torontonians lean towards the old, strong kind.

Dutch Immigrant Carving History On Ottawa Walls

OTTAWA (CP)—William Oosterhoff, a genial 57-year-old Dutch immigrant, is making his mark in Canada. And it's a mark seen by thousands of persons every year.

He is in charge of the delicate job of carving scenes from Canadian history on the stone walls of the Parliament Building. He took over the task in 1950 when Cleophas Soucy died and he's been at it ever since. This summer the job is rolling along in high gear with day and night shifts in which Oosterhoff and three assistants ply hammer, chisel and pneumatic drill.

The project has been going on for 25 years while a permanent record of Canada's history and progress, of her great men and achievements, is worked into the limestone walls.

CARVE MUCH DETAIL

At this stage Oosterhoff and his men are working in the central rotunda at the base of the Peace Tower, where the crests of the 10 provinces and their capitals will form the central theme.

The assistants have been working on the Maritime provinces section. Oosterhoff himself is doing smaller plaques depicting events in Quebec history. He designs the figures and symbols to be carved, but does the more difficult carving, such as faces and hands, himself.

He came to Canada in 1925 and has carved such works as the Memorial Arch at Niagara Falls, the big coat-of-arms over Sunnybrook Hospital in Toronto and the crest for the Ontario Hydro Commission there.

Oosterhoff's carving career began when he was eight, using potatoes. From there it was only a matter of years until he was carving in wood, stone and metal.

He attended a sculpturing school in Holland and did work as a sculptor on the buildings of Bistrol University.

Professional curiosity brought him to Ottawa. In 1949, he visited the Parliament Buildings and spent so much time peering at the carving that the guards became suspicious and asked him what he was doing.

He explained that he was a stone carver by profession and the guard obtained his telephone number and passed it along to

That's the finding of investigations by the Department of agriculture into cheese consumption trends in the three cities. The department found almost all families in the three cities use some type of cheese. Less than five per cent of the housewives interviewed indicated they never have cheese on the family menu.

The investigation disclosed that processed cheese is somewhat more popular than Cheddar but most families use both types. Cheddar cheese is used in 90 per cent of Ottawa cheese-using households compared with 80 per cent in Vancouver and 70 per cent in Toronto.

Cottage cheese is used in about three-quarters of all Vancouver cheese-consuming households, much more than in the other two cities. Other kinds of cheese such as Gruyere, Oka and Danish Blue are used by one-third to one-half of all families in each of the three centres.

The investigators found colored cheese was more favored than the uncolored kind. The department concluded this was because colored cheese "looks more appetizing and has eye appeal."

Soucy who was then in charge of the carving.

Soucy failed in his first attempt to hire Oosterhoff but was successful when a job in Toronto started a month later than Oosterhoff had expected. He has been working here ever since.

Oosterhoff hopes to be here a long time yet. He estimates it will take at least 20 years to complete the program.
