ESKIMO MANAGER OFF TO LAND OF ESKIMOS IN NORTH

Hockey Mogul of Alberta Goes Off Quietly and is Well on Way to Arctic

EDMONTON, April 15.—A little better than a month ago, Kenny Mackenzie, manager of the Eskimo hockey team, emulated the Arabs and, folding his tent, flitted silently into the night. Mr. Mackenzie is not prone to discuss his plans with the wide world, and as far as was known the man who guided the destiny of the Edmonton team purposed taking a short trip into the Grande Prairie country.

Mr. Mackenzie has not returned from the near North, and he is not likely to do so now as he is well on his way to the Arctic, where the Edmonton Eskimo will meet his compatriots of Killaruit and Coronation Gulf, and where, for the white fox skins from the shores of the Frozen Sea he will trade the manufactures and foods of the white man.

First Trader Down

It is the intention of the hockey magnate to be the first trader down to the Arctic coast this season, he aims to reach the northern treasure house of furs prior to his competitors, who will freight their goods north from Edmonton by rail and then down the long reaches of the poleward flowing rivers, and for this reason Mr. Mackenzie has headed out over the new winter trail from Fort St. John, on the upper waters of the Peace River, to the Fort Nelson River.

By utilizing this route he will get to the Arctic at least six weeks ahead of the other traders—if the fates are kind and his sews are not wrecked in the rapid waters of the Nelson and the Liard. The latter stream empties into the Mackenzie at Fort Simpson, and by travelling down this river the northern voyager reaches open water in the lower stretches of the big stream a considerable time before the ice in the Great Slave Lake has melted, thus allowing the river craft to proceed to their destination at the top of the map.
