



High School And Monday's Paper.

On Monday the editorial staff of this paper will retire temporarily and allow the members of the High School Literary Society to take their places. This society is made up of the university classes of the High School and the scheme of giving them charge is designed to give them an insight into the making of a small daily newspaper in order that if any of them should wish to take up journalism as a profession they would understand something of what the work meant. It should also tend to enlarge their knowledge of world affairs, showing that each profession has its peculiar attractions and difficulties.

From the time the paper goes to press this afternoon until Monday's paper is out, the High School will be in complete charge in the editorial offices. They will report the local news happenings, the police court, the gossip of people coming and going and will also handle the telegraphic despatches, letters to the editor and everything that is published outside of the advertising department. That they will not touch.

Naturally the cause of education and the doings of the High School will receive a lot of attention and those who wish to keep in close touch with the local educational institution will do well to read the number carefully. JANUARY OUTPUT OF HIDDEN CREEK MINE ALMOST A RECORD

ANYOX, Feb. 9. — In tonnage output for January, the Hidden Creek Mine of the Granby Company almost reached the peak month of production. Only once has the tonnage of January, 1924, been exceeded in the history of the camp. Previous high marks were made as follows: January, 1918, 85,933 tons; May, 1921, 88,975 tons; April, 1922, 87,138 tons. The figures for January, 1924, are 87,509 tons. All these figures will be easily outdistanced when the concentrator, now nearing completion, is in operation and functioning to capacity.

WILD IRISH ROSE IS COMING ON MONDAY
