### Ten Years Ago in Prince Rupert

August 23, 1914

Japan has declared war on Germany and Italy is mobilizing in preparation to protect Switzerland. On the Eastern front Russia continues victorious over Austria. There is desperate fighting going on in Belgium over a 20-mile front with action centred at Namur.

District headquarters issues a statement that under no circumstances will men not in possession of certificates of military qualifications be appointed as commissioned officers in any Canadian contingent. No unqualified officers will be allowed to proceed to Valcartier as commissioned officers.

A rancher named John Haverty has been brought to the city by R. C. W. Lett, G.T.P. tourist and colonization agent. He was found alone and paralyzed in a cabin five miles up the Lakelse valley by Mr. Lett's party.

### MOVING SETTLERS FROM DROUGHT AREA

Alberta Department of Agriculture Taking Steps to Settle Farmers in Other Sections

EDMONTON, Aug. 23. — The government's plans are now complete to deal with farmers that wish to move from the drought areas, but its hands are tied until a decision has been made by the board of railway commissioners as to the action that the railways will take.

The proposition that has been placed before that board is that all three interested parties pay one-third of the cost of transportation, which is the same arrangement that held good last fall.

#### List of Lands

The Provincial Department of Agriculture, which is handling the relief scheme to facilitate the movement of settlers to new locations, has worked out a tabulation of lands available for the purpose, and has secured listings from the lands settlement board, which were originally set up for soldier settler purposes, and later thrown open to immigrants and colonization requirements of all kinds.

The bulk of these lands are in the northern part of the province, and are likely to appeal to a large proportion of the moving farmers. South Western Alberta is also likely to gain by the movement, and it is expected that a considerable number of settlers will locate in the country around Pincher Creek and Cardston.

#### Preparat to Move

Field agents are at present on the ground in the drought-stricken areas arranging for farmer-debtors to have their affairs in such shape that they will be ready to move directly word has been received from Winnipeg. The field agents are working in conjunction with the Debt Adjustment Office in Calgary, and are attending conferences between the embarrassed farmers and their creditors, so that when the movement takes place the farmers will be able to do so without evading their financial responsibilities or being involved in legal difficulties. It is expected that with reasonable care satisfactory arrangements can be made in all cases likely to develop.


