DUG SHAFT TO CATCH COYOTE

Vanderhoof Man Took Novel Means to Exterminate Pest of Long Standing

M. J. Griffin recently had an exciting experience catching a coyote, says the Nechako Chronicle of Vanderhoof. For many months the animal had been stealing chickens and Griffin was determined to get him. Traps were laid, but without result until last week, when the thief was at last caught by the leg. He carried the trap with him into the bush, and for several hours Mr. Griffin followed the coyote through the forest. The animal eventually found an old den in a knoll, the entrance being at the foot.

As it would have been dangerous procedure to attempt to go after him at the mouth of the den Mr. Griffin drove a shaft down the centre from the top, some ten feet, partly by digging and part by means of powder. The last charge reached the den and was sufficient to stun the captive. Mr. Griffin then went down the shaft after his prize, with a shovel as his only weapon but, by the time he reached the bottom, the animal was getting over his dazed spell. Mr. Griffin was in a tight corner, having no space to be able to strike the beast, and was only able to use chopping tactics. For a minute or two the fight was desperate and exciting. Finally Griffin got the coyote by the tail, and scrambled up the shaft with him. After reaching the top and being in a position to meet his opponent on more advantageous terms, the brute was easily despatched.

DROWNED AT BUCKLEY BAY DURING STORM

Isaac Parnell Fell Into Water When Changing Seats; Leaves Widow and Children

BUCKLEY BAY, March 12.—Isaac Parnell, an employee of the Massett Timber Co. Ltd., was drowned on the night of February 26. During the very severe wind and rain storm Parnell, in company with S. Russ, attempted to bring his boat ashore from one of the booms of the company to which it was tied and in changing seats with Russ both were thrown into the water. Russ was found by one of the other Indians clinging to a log in an exhausted condition. Parnell's body was found the next evening about 6.30. He leaves a widow and several small children to mourn their loss.

An inquest was held and a verdict of "Drowned" was brought in by the jury. The funeral took place at Massett, the Church Army and various societies attending. Service was held in the Church of St. John, the missionary Rev. W. J. E. Pamplin officiating, and the

CARVER OF TOTEMS GIVES UP HIS WORK

George L. Young of Skidegate Dies and is Buried by Rev. William Allen

SKIDEGATE, March 12.—Geo. L. Young, one of the oldest of the Indians in this village and considered the cleverest carver of jadeite totems on the island, died last week and his funeral took place here, Rev. William Allen officiating.

A number of years ago Mr. Young was interested in mining both on Moresby and Graham Islands. In Prince Rupert he met with an accident by falling into an open chute on the corner of Third Ave. and Fifth Street from which he suffered for a number of years up to the time of his death. He was well known and at one time was a chief. He was highly respected by both Indians and white people on the islands.

PIONEER PROSPECTOR OF Omineca District PASSED AWAY SUNDAY

Joe Fisher, well known pioneer prospector of the central interior district, died at Smithers last Sunday. After years spent in the Omineca mountains, deceased was just about to realize on a property which is under development by A. C. Garde, M.E., of Prince Rupert when his death occurred. He is survived by a sister in Ketchikan. The funeral took place at Smithers.

QUEEN CHARLOTTES

Two mining parties are engaged in seeking gold and aluminum on the shores of Graham Island. The "Blue Jacket Mine" has been re-opened, while machinery and men are working on the "black sand" deposits of the East coast.

R. Wilks aged 73 years died on Sunday last, at Massett Township. The deceased suffered for many years from cancer. He leaves a number of relatives on

Graham Island, including a son and daughter, with a number of grand children. The many friends throughout the islands extend their sympathy to Mrs. Wilks, who has been an invalid for some time. The funeral took place at Massett Cemetery, on Friday, Rev. J. Gillett officiating.

Messrs. Eimons and McPhail, who have been examining the shale and oil deposits on Yakoun river, left on the steamer for Vancouver and Portland. They intend commencing development work in the near future on the oil and larvia deposits.

The two clam canneries of the Langara Fishing and Packing Company are in active operation, at Naden Harbor and Haden river. The construction of residences and the erection of a large canning plant is now in progress.
