The waterfront business has been slightly interfered with by the Victoria Day holiday intervening on Monday last when the Fish Exchange did not operate and the other business houses were closed. However, the holiday has had little effect upon the volume of work carried out during the remainder of the week and a small thing like a holiday does not retard the fishermen or their colleagues very much. On Tuesday some 300,000 pounds of halibut was marketed on the Fish Exchange when prices for both American and Canadian landings dropped a few points.

While the weather man did not serve up a particularly brilliant brand of weather for the holiday, it might have been worse. In spite of several intermittent showers, the nautical fraternity and their families were astir early in the day and many of the schooners in port put out for distant points loaded with joyous fares of women and children.

Weldon McAfee of the Georgetown mill has taken over the management of the local office for the Bag Bay Lumber Co. in the absence of Ralph Le Pine, who, accompanied by Mrs. Le Pine, is taking a prolonged holiday in southern cities including Los Angeles.

With the local canneries getting into the season's stride, there is considerable activity among the large packing and work boats of the fleet and several of the larger utility boats in port have been overhauled and are in readiness to engage in this class of work. A flotilla of native boats has been in port this week from the Naas river district and Kitkatla on their way to the canneries.

Purchases New Launch
Hubert Ward has recently purchased the 33 foot launch Bonanza from Anyox interests and is disposing of his former launch Eva. The Bonanza has a beam of 9 foot, is powered with a 10-12 h.p. Palmer engine attaining a speed of around 7 miles per hour and has sleeping accommodation for 4 persons. At present the launch is on the McLean ways for a general overhaul and painting. The first trial of the boat was given over the holiday week end when Mr. and Mrs. Ward and son took a run out to Spiller River to enjoy the trout fishing at that point. The return trip was made in 2 hours and 40 minutes against the tide.

W. Ridley, of Kitkatla, has his new 12 h.p. Fairbanks-Morse gas engine installed in his boat and will proceed to the salmon trolling grounds immediately.

New Boat Launched
Cass Edwards' new 62 foot halibut boat has been completed in Vancouver and was launched on May 20. Mrs. K. Newell, of 119 Cordova Street, Vancouver, sponsor for the boat, officiated at the launching ceremony and christened the new craft "Emma K.". The Emma K., which is rated as one of the smartest boats on the coast, took the water splendidly.

We understand that Mr. Bushby will permit "Handsome" Jim to pose for the summer tourists at stated intervals in the interests of the port.

The Latest Engine

The latest and one of the finest marine engines to arrive in Prince Rupert, and for that matter in the Dominion, is the 20 h.p. Denmark diesel engine, manufactured by the Hein Sonos Company to be installed in the new Haymoller trolling boat which is being built in the McLean yards. This engine is of the full diesel 4 cycle class and one of the most reliable crude oil engines on the market today. A feature of the engine is that it so well counter-balanced that it does not necessarily need to be bolted in a boat at all. The makers guarantee that it can be run at full speed on the stand unfastened and that it will not move a fraction of an inch. The vibration is therefore nil. The engine is now at the McLean yards and is causing a great deal of interest among local fishing boat owners.

Henry Carlson of Kitkatla is in port with his power boat Kathleen and is having considerable repair work done on her at the McLean yards. The hull is being entirely recaulked while re-planking and deck remodeling will also be carried out. The engine will also be rebed.

Changing Engines

The power boat Wake, Capt. Clarke, is being powered with a Fairbanks 4 cylinder gas engine recently purchased from Dr. Sagar of Port Simpson. Dr. Sagar has taken the engine from the mission boat Northern Cross, Canon Rushbrook, who is putting in a new Standard medium duty engine.

Capt. Claude Ketchum has recently overhauled the engine in his power boat Wigwam.

Tugboat Busy

The tugboat M.T.S., Capt. R. Green, flagship of the Bushby towing fleet, arrived in port on Tuesday evening from Georgetown having in tow a scow load of fish boxes for the Pacific and Booth Fisheries. The tug has since left for Stewart with a cargo of pack horses and on her return south will bring a boom of loss from Wark Canal for the northern mill.

The schooner Lyskil, Capt. Peter Jensen, has been taken up on the dry dock pontoons to have her stuffing box and stern bearing fixed. Upon the termination of this repair work the Lyskil will cease fishing and will take over a contract with the Port Edward cannery.
