

DRYDOCK BUSY SMALL REPAIRS

Tug Qualicum to Have Propeller Repaired Before Returning South

The dry dock is still kept fairly busy handling various repair jobs of more or less importance.

The Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co.'s cannery tender, W. R. Lord is being taken on the pontoons this afternoon for cleaning and painting.

The department of Marine and Fisheries patrol boat Linnell is also being taken up today for annual overhaul. More of these boats probably be handled at the yard.

The C. P. R. tug Qualicum, which went ashore on Digby Island yesterday morning, is to be lifted out on Saturday for propeller repairs. Whether or not the Transfer Barge No. 4, which had a hole punched in her hull, will have to go up will be determined after a survey is made by Capt. McGoskie. The barge is at the ocean dock discharging crosscut timber for the elevator.

The new cruiser for the forestry department, built at the yard, has had her engine running and will have her trial runs in a day or so. It is expected that she will be turned over to the department about the end of the week.

MORE SETTLERS FOR WESTERN POINTS

Twelve Families Under British Empire Settlement Plan

WINNIPEG, April 22.—Twelve more families, 63 persons, are leaving Winnipeg today for points throughout the prairie provinces to settle on farms under the British Empire settlement plan. They arrived in Winnipeg this morning by special Canadian National train from the steamships Laconia and Doric, having travelled west with some 65 other British immigrants and 50 Europeans.
