## AMBASSADOR AND FAMILY

Sons of Sir Esme Howard Travel  
Second Class and Put on  
No Side

### FATHER IS HUMAN

Meets People as Men and They Forget he is a Great Official

NEW YORK, Jan. 22.—(By Canadian Press).—When two of the schoolboy sons of Sir Esme Howard, British ambassador to the United States, sailed recently for England to resume their studies at Cambridge, the passengers on the Paris were given a further demonstration of the democracy of the British ambassador and his family. The two boys, Hubert, 17, and Francis, 19, occupied a second class cabin. Ship news reporters repaired in amazement to the second class quarters to interview the lads who were found unpacking their belongings. The reporters expressed their surprise.

"Surprised," laughed Hubert,

"really there's nothing to be surprised at. These are the only accommodations we can afford. It is less expensive and works less hardship than if we travelled in the first class. You see, my father has five sons and we are travelling most of the time, so there have to be economies. Besides, we like to travel this way; it is more quiet and we school-boys are better where it is quiet."

### Human Person

Sir Esme did not see his sons off, it being explained that he had taken two of his younger sons to their school at Lakehurst, N.J.

The reporter in writing of the interview, took occasion to pay a tribute to Sir Esme, who, he said, was most human and did not know the meaning of the words "put on." "Sir Esme," he said, "does not play according to the rules Mr. Hoyle would have decreed for the social world."

After describing the interview with Sir Esme's sons the writer continued:

"Sir Esme would have said the same thing had he been at the French Line pier yesterday. I know because he was just that human when he arrived here aboard the Olympic for his new post about a year ago. He wanted to meet personally all the reporters, told one of them that he resembled somewhat his eldest son, and before we could fire the heavy questions about politics, economics, etc., he was apologizing because his cabin was too small to accommodate all the news gatherers.

"They adjourned to the writing room of the ship, and he passed out a box of cigars, said he wasn't sure just what their papers would want from him, but he would try to help them; 'but remember,' he smiled, 'a diplomat has the right to hold back a little bit of news now and then from you gentlemen.

"And I want you to meet my sons when they come over; they couldn't get out of school at this time, and their mother has been forced to remain there with them. Then I intend to bring them over here where they can get an idea of your public schools; I've heard a lot of nice things about them."

### Talked Familiarly

"He talked along in that manner until the reporters thought they were chatting with one of the men at the office, and the next moment he might ask them for a match or tell them about the party he was on the night previous.

"I've often wondered if this human man and his family aren't forced to smile inwardly at some of their neighbors in the diplomatic circles in Washington, where they live more according to Hoyle, not Howard."

## MANSON EXPLAINS AND CHILLIWACK MAYOR IS SENT HOME SATISFIED

VICTORIA, Jan. 22.—Mayor C. A. Barber of Chilliwack, came to Victoria to protest to Attorney-General Manson against his bill for liquor law enforcement and left well satisfied with Mr. Manson's attitude on the liquor question.

"We have reached a very satisfactory agreement and I am well pleased with the Attorney-General's attitude," Mr. Barber told newspaper men when he left Mr. Manson's office. "It is true that the deductions from Chilliwack's liquor profits for law enforcement costs were high but apparently there is no remedy for this and we must bear it. The legal costs, I think, were particularly high. However, I am well satisfied with Mr. Manson's explanations and I believe we shall have co-operation and harmony in the future."

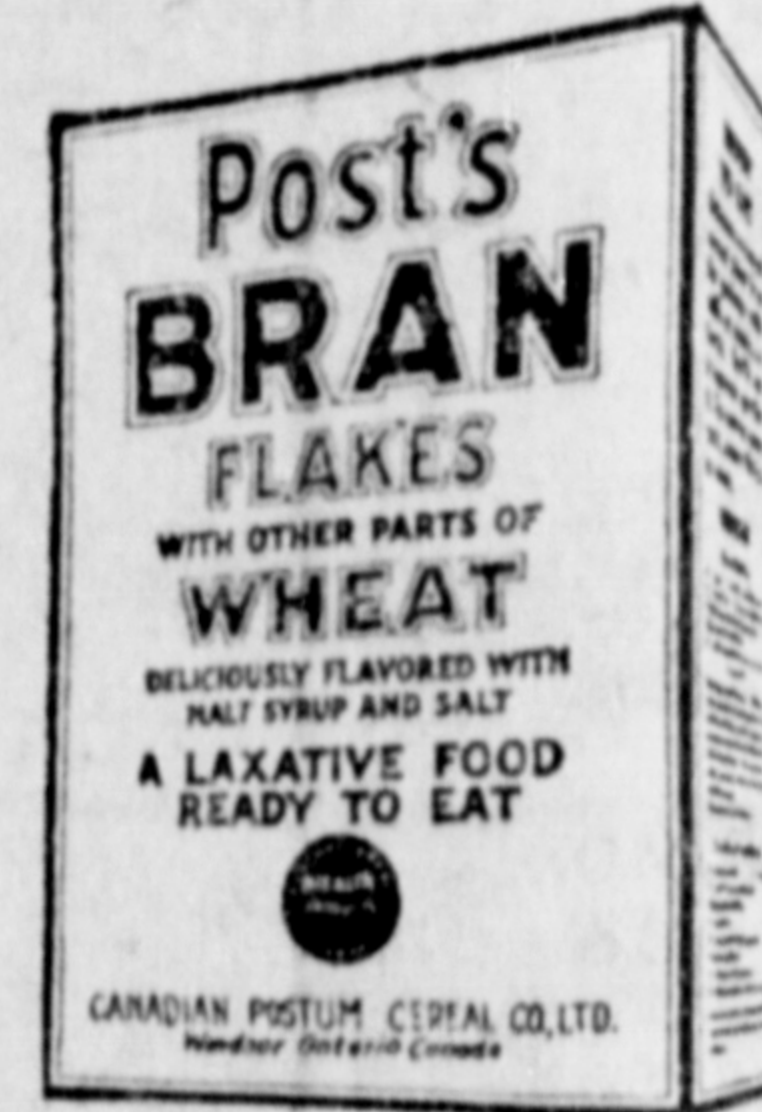
