### Inauguration Of President Coolidge.

There is nothing spectacular about President Coolidge except his reticence. He is so quiet and talks so little that he comes to us rather as a surprise, especially for a politician and an American politician at that.

Possibly Coolidge will rank among the big presidents, and the men who have headed the American nation have been men of no mean ability.

Coolidge, like Roosevelt, got his position through the misfortune of the man who preceded him. Perhaps like Roosevelt he will be known for many years after as an outstanding man. Today he is president in his own right, because he is the chosen of the people for the position. We join with the rest of Canada in our small way in wishing him every success. May his administration bring great honor to the nation he represents and closer friendship between his nation and ours.

### Islands Likely To Be Prosperous.

Queen Charlotte Islands seem likely to be very prosperous this summer. With the mills at Buckley Bay and Port Clements working and with probable renewed activity in connection with the gold mining on the black sands around Massett and the fishing and clam canning, the prosperity of the northern part of the island is assured.

At Queen Charlotte City the mill will be ready for operation about April 1 and from that on it is expected to be running steadily all summer. That combined with the fishing and some mining activity and logging should make the southern islands and the south end of Graham Island very busy. Everywhere there are signs of commercial revival at the Queen Charlottes.

## SCHEDULE FOR PRINCE CHARLES

New C.N.R. Boat Will Serve Prince Rupert, Stewart and Anox this Summer

Under the summer schedule of the Canadian National Coast steamers which will come into effect on June 22, the new steamer Prince Charles will relieve the steamers Prince Rupert and Prince George in the Vancouver-Prince Rupert-Stewart and Anox route.

The Prince Rupert or Prince George will sail Monday night from Vancouver arriving here on Wednesdays and proceeding to Alaska. The same two vessels will maintain a service out of Vancouver on Wednesday and Prince Rupert on Friday making the double-ended run to Stewart and Anox as last season.

The third boat of the week to Prince Rupert and second to Stewart and Anox will be the Prince Charles, the schedule of which will be as follows:

Leave Vancouver 8 p.m. Saturday, calling at Powell River, Ocean Falls, Prince Rupert (10-30 a.m. Monday) Anox and Stewart, arriving at the latter port at 6 p.m. on Tuesday. Leaving Stewart at midnight on Tuesday, the Prince Charles will commence her return trip, calling at the same places enroute to Vancouver, (Prince Rupert Wednesday) arriving at Vancouver at 9 a.m. on Friday, taking six days for the round trip.

Under the summer schedule, steamers will arrive here from the south at 10:30 Wednesday, Friday and Monday mornings. The Wednesday boat will sail at 4 o'clock in the afternoon for Alaska returning here at 10:30 Monday morning and sailing for the south at 4 o'clock Monday afternoon. The Friday boat will sail at 4 o'clock in the afternoon for Anox, returning here at 5 o'clock Saturday afternoon and sailing an hour later at 6 o'clock for the south. The Monday boat from the south (Prince Charles) will sail at 4 o'clock in the afternoon for Anox and Stewart (making Anox both going to and coming from Stewart) and return here at 4 o'clock Wednesday afternoon, sailing for the south at 6 o'clock.

The spring schedule of the C.N.R. steamers will be operative between April 20 and June 22. Both the Prince Rupert and Prince George will then be on the run with arrivals at Prince Rupert from the south at 10:30 Wednesday and Saturday mornings. The Wednesday boat will go to Anox and the Saturday boat to Stewart and sailings for the south will be at 8 p.m. Thursdays and Sundays.

The Prince John will be maintained during the summer on the Vancouver-Queen Charlotte Island-Prince Rupert schedule with sailings from Vancouver and Prince Rupert on alternate Saturdays as at present. Before entering this service, however, the John will be given an extensive overhaul as soon as the Prince Charles arrives from the Old Country to relieve her on the Island run.

The Prince John will be maintained during the summer on the Vancouver-Queen Charlotte Island-Prince Rupert schedule with sailings from Vancouver and Prince Rupert on alternate Saturdays as at present. Before entering this service, however, the John will be given an extensive overhaul as soon as the Prince Charles arrives from the Old Country to relieve her on the Island run.

## FRENCH NOVELIST TO VISIT PRINCE RUPERT

Louis Frederiek Rouquette Carrying Legion of Honor For French Government

WINNIPEG, Mar. 1.—On his way to Edmonton to carry out a special mission for the French government, Louis Frederiek Rouquette, novelist and journalist of Paris, will arrive in Winnipeg tonight by Canadian National Railways, it was announced last evening.

Mr. Rouquette has been commissioned by Baron de Vitrolles, Consul General for France, acting on instructions received from Premier Herriot, to present to His Grace, Bishop Grouard, Apostolic vicar of Athabasca, the Cross of the Legion of Honor which was awarded him some time ago.

Mr. Rouquette, who is himself a Knight of the Order, will preside at the official presentation and give the "Acceclade" to the new knight, Robert George Brett, M.D., Lieut.-Governor of Alberta, has been invited by the Consul General of France to attend the ceremony with members of his staff.

This will be the third time Mr.

Rouquette has visited Canada. In 1915 he crossed the continent and in 1916 he went to Alaska where he spent eighteen months. Mr. Rouquette, beside being familiar with the northlands, was also a member of the Shackleton expedition to the South where he acted in the capacity of meteorologist.

From Edmonton Mr. Rouquette will go to Prince Rupert, proceeding from there by boat to Vancouver and Seattle. He will later return east from Vancouver over the National system. Mr. Rouquette's novels all have large circulations in Europe, including two works on Canada, and it is his intention to write a third novel from the notes obtained on the present journey. Mr. Rouquette is accompanied by Madame Rouquette.

## Ten Years Ago in Prince Rupert

Sidney Jones, director of the Blue Funnel Line, who is visiting Prince Rupert, will go to Anox before proceeding to England by the overland route. He is much impressed with this port but has nothing to say as to the possibilities of his steamers using it in the near future.

Big developments on silver-lead and copper properties in the Hazelton district may be looked for this year according to A. D. Harris and other mining men. Large shipments of copper will be made to the Granby smelter within the next two or three weeks while ores, carrying silver and lead and even some gold, will be sent in 100 ton lots through Prince Rupert to the Trail smelter in May.

It is announced by the Marine Department that work will commence at an early date on the construction of a new concrete light house at Cape Mudge, entrance to Discovery Passage. The light will be of a flashing type replacing the fixed one at present in operation.

## HUGE QUANTITY FISH EGGS ARE COLLECTED

Fry Will be Distributed in Spring in Suitable Waters

OTTAWA, March 1.—The Department of Marine and Fisheries collected over 741,000,000 fish eggs during the fall season of 1924. These eggs are now undergoing incubation in the various hatcheries from coast to coast and the resultant fry will next spring be distributed in suitable waters throughout Canada. The collection according to species is as follows:

An interesting point in connection with the collection at St. John hatchery, New Brunswick, is that over 1,000,000 speckled trout and over 79,000 brown trout eggs were taken at the ponds from parent fish, which themselves have been reared at this point from the fry stage.

## WATER NOTICE.

**USE AND STORAGE**  
TAKE NOTICE that Massett Timber Co., Limited, whose address is 708 Pacific Building, Vancouver, B.C., will apply for a licence to take and use 500 cubic feet per second, and to store 75M. acre-feet of water out of stream known as Anox River, which flows southward and drains into Massett Inlet, about one and one-half miles easterly from Buckley Bay, B.C.
