In connection with the passage at last night's council meeting of the local improvement bylaw providing for the mattress grading of Graham Avenue Ald. Ste-\$126.00 phens was again active in his 129.50 opposition of such work being 134.00 done unless it was -immediately 153.62 necessary and the passage of 156.56 such bylaws if it was not intend-189.56 ed to proceed with the work at once. He pointed to the warning that had been sounded by the inspector of municipalities in connection with the large amount of local improvement work being done by this city and, expressed the belief that such work was affecting the general finances of the city much more than might be believed. He was not in favor of going ahead with grading if the plank roads could be kept in use for a while longer without too great cost.

Ald. Perry said that, as far as Graham Avenue was concerned. the plank road would have to have large expenditure made on it this year if it were to be used the interest of economy to grade ing material.



Only One Death in Metaliferous Mines in Three Months

VICTORIA, June 23 .- Indicative of the results achieved under the policy inaugurated by Hon. William Sloan, minister of mines, when he assumed that important portfolio in 1916, the annual toil of lives claimed of mine workers in British Columbia has annually been cut down until today this province ranks ahead of other mining countries in the number of casualties among underground workers and is looked upon as a shining example of what can be done to protect the lives of workers in the mines by intelligent and persistent effort in enacting adequate regulations enforcing mine safety.

In the first quarter of the present year, according to figures just issued by Hon. Mr. Sloan, not a single fatality occurred in the coal mines of British Columbia, and but one death in the metalliferous mines. In the same quarter in 1924 there were five fatalities. This showing is all the more satisfactory in view of the great increase in mining operations in the province during the past; year.
