LIQUOR EXPORT BUSINESS BAD

War of Extermination Against B.C. Fleet Reason For Many Conferences

MAY ABANDON BUSINESS

Charged That U.S. Goes Beyond Rights But Britain and Canada Not Worrying

VANCOUVER, Feb. 23.—Vancouver liquor interests have held a series of meetings within the past two days, and others are planned so that the members of the ring will be in almost continuous session until a campaign is formulated to deal with the war of extermination begun by the United States prohibition enforcement service with the seizure of the rum-runner Quaira and having its second phase in the capture of the Steamship Coal Harbor with a half million dollar cargo off San Francisco this week.

The twelve mile treaty is being defied, they declare and it is a question for Empire interference, but they hesitate to try and make an international row out of the situation believing that Canada and Great Britain

Shareholders Divided

VANCOUVER MAY GET LARGE COLD STORAGE PLANT

Mitchell Albert is Moving Spirit in Big Enterprise Planned For Southern City

M. Aivazoff (Mitchell Albert), formerly of Prince Rupert, is negotiating with various large interests with a view to constructing a \$2,000,000 cold storage plant at Vancouver. He has assurances that the Fiji government will assist construction of such a plant in order to develop the Fijian fresh fruit trade to Canada and has other interests who will provide sufficient money to complete the work. He has suggested that the Vancouver Harbor Board do nothing in the matter of erecting a cold storage plant until it has been proven that private capital will not do it. Mr. Albert is leaving Vancouver shortly for the East to meet New York and other Eastern capitalists who have signified their willingness to enter into the erection of a cold storage plant at Vancouver.

ATTEMPT TO RAISE ZEBRAS IN ENGLAND

Twenty-two Animals Brought From Africa Recently as Experiment

LONDON, Feb. 23.—Zebras from the wilds of Rhodesia are soon to be added to the animal collection of several of the vast British and Scottish estates, where they will be allowed nearly as much freedom as in their native haunts. Twenty-two zebras arrived in London recently for G. B. Chapman, an animal importer, who will have charge of the experiment of raising the little striped beasts in this climate.

Several pairs will be assigned to the grounds surrounding Chilham Castle, in Kent, owned by Edmond Davis, while others will go to H. Whitley's Primley Park, Paignton, Devon and 8 to 10 others to Bealock Park, Dumfriesshire, owned by Sir William Cross.
