STEWARDESS IS DISMISSED FOR WEARING BREEKS

Not Considered Proper Garb When Serving Meals in Arctic Circle

EDMONTON, Feb. 16. — Because the Northern Trading Company, Limited, decreed that riding breeches and a khaki shirt were not the proper garb for a stewardess to wear when serving meals in the Arctic circle to hardy northerners and other denizens of the broad open spaces who were being transported on their boats, Alice Joyce, a university student, who had severed several months of last year on the Northland Echo, lost her job and brought suit against the company for \$50 for transportation and a bonus of \$25 in the district court before His Honor Judge Crawford. A. L. Sawle, a director of the company, stated that while he was on an inspection trip on the Northland Echo last year, Miss Joyce appeared at different times in breeches and khaki shirt. He objected to this costume as he did not consider it becoming one for a stewardess among such a class of men. He also objected to Miss Joyce sitting in the purser's cabin so garbed. Towards the end of the return trip in October he asked her to wear her proper uniform on one of the occasions and Miss Joyce refused. He then told her if she continued to do these things she could consider herself no longer in the company's service, to which the answer was, "That's Jake with me."

Mr. Sawle was cross-examined by G. H. Van Allen as to the number of times Miss Joyce had worn the breeches and why he had not complained before. He answered that the company wanted discipline, but liked to give a certain amount of leeway to its employees. "But there's a limit to everything," he added.

Thought Reasonable
Part of the contract with Miss Joyce was that in consideration of her services being satisfactory the company would refund her \$50, the fare and return to Waterways, with the addition of a \$5 per month bonus. His Honor Judge Crawford thought that the request to discard the clothes was a reasonable one to make so far north, but reserved his judgment to review the conditions of service.

PRICE OF FURS ON NEW YORK MARKET

Sale Commenced with Red Fox, White Fox, Lynx and Squirrel

NEW YORK, Feb. 16. — Bidding for red fox featured the opening sessions of the five million dollar fur auction here. The sale is the largest to be held in this city since the boom days of 1919 and 1920. Buyers were present from all the leading fur markets of this country and Canada as well as from France and Germany. The best price received for red fox was \$35. This fur is much in demand for trimmings at the present time and manufacturers bought it freely. White fox brought a top price of \$50 while the best lynx pelts fetched \$30.50. Wild cat brought prices ranging up to \$11 and the best skins in a collection of nearly two hundred thousand squirrels sold at \$1.20. An offering of sixty-six thousand ermine was sold at prices ranging to \$3.65 each.

Compared with the average prices received at the fall sale of the New York Auction Company the furs sold yesterday showed the following percentages advances. White fox ten, eastern Canadian and north-western red fox 15; other red fox unchanged; lynx 25; wild cat 25; squirrel, unchanged and ermine twenty.
