WHITE BEARS ARE NUMEROUS

Joe McPhee, Customs Officer at Butedale says they are Good Size on Princess Royal

That the white bears known as Ursus Kermodei are quite common on Princess Royal Island and that some of them are larger than is the general impression is the information given by Joe McPhee, customs officer at Butedale, who is in the city, and who is returning to the cannery this afternoon.

It was near Butedale that the bear, now in captivity at Victoria was caught. The one taken was one of several seen at that time and Indians and hunters have at various times seen the bears. After being caught it was kept for some time at the cannery before being sent to Victoria.

The specimens, which first attracted the notice of scientists, were taken on Gribble Island, adjoining Princess Royal. They were described by Frank Kermode, curator of the provincial museum at Victoria and Dr. Hornaday of the museum of natural history in New York decided that it was a new and distinct species. Four specimens are mounted in the provincial museum at Victoria and one young one is in captivity at Beacon Hill Park, Victoria, the one that was caught near Butedale.

The white bear is no relation whatever to the big polar bear. It is smaller than the ordinary black bear and is said to be a species that is gradually dying out and is found only at certain favored places on the mainland. It is of a creamy white color.
