

# MADE RECORD IN HANDLING SALMON HERE

Pacific Stevedoring Company Does Rapid Work from Power Boat Bellingham

What is regarded as pretty much of a record on this coast has recently been made by the Pacific Stevedoring Co. here in the unloading of Alaskan salmon from the motorship Bellingham, at the ocean dock. As high as 1920 cases has been taken off the vessel from one hatch in one hour and piled in the shed where it will await shipment East over the Canadian National Railway. The average was over 1300 cases to the hour from the one hatch.

During the past ten days, the Bellingham has brought approximately 35,000 cases of salmon here in four trips. Last night she arrived with 8,000 cases which will finish up the shipments that are to be made here in the meantime as the 1924 pack has now been pretty well cleaned up. This salmon has come from Ketchikan where it was assembled.

# FISH HELD UP CAR SHORTAGE

Railway Tieup Delays Sale of Halibut Here as Cars Did Not Arrive

400,000 LBS. OFFERING

The tie-up on the railway today is having a serious effect on the halibut market. There are 16 refrigerator cars due but none are here. Had they been on hand making it possible for the fish to be despatched East on this afternoon's train, over 400,000 pounds of halibut which was offering at the Exchange this morning would have been handled. As it is, there was none of it touched except the 7,000 pound catch of the Canadian boat W.T. which was purchased by the Allin Fisheries at 7 1/2c, and 4c. Several of the American boats it is expected will proceed to Seattle.

# NEWMAN ERB WAS A SPECTACULAR FIGURE

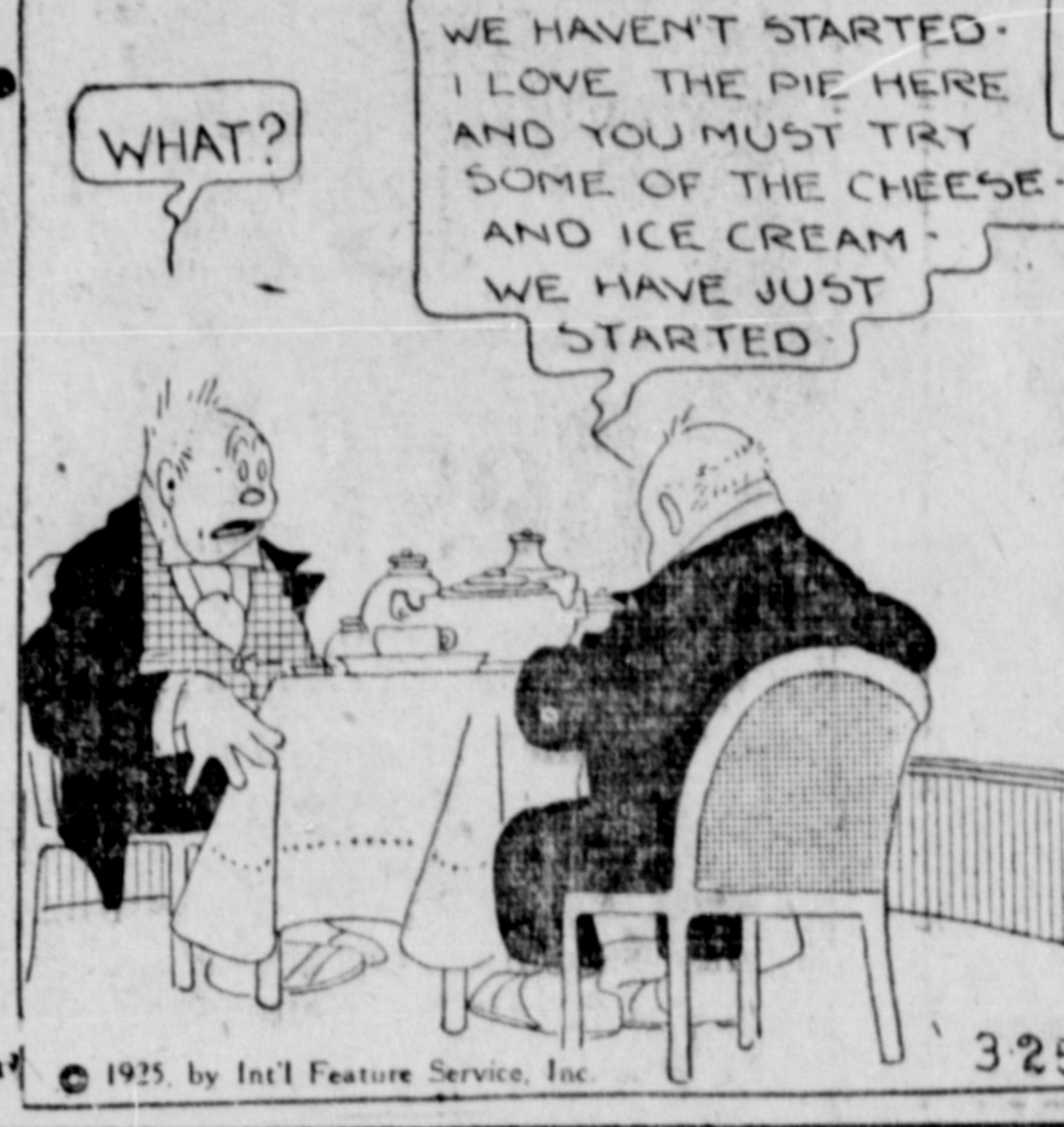
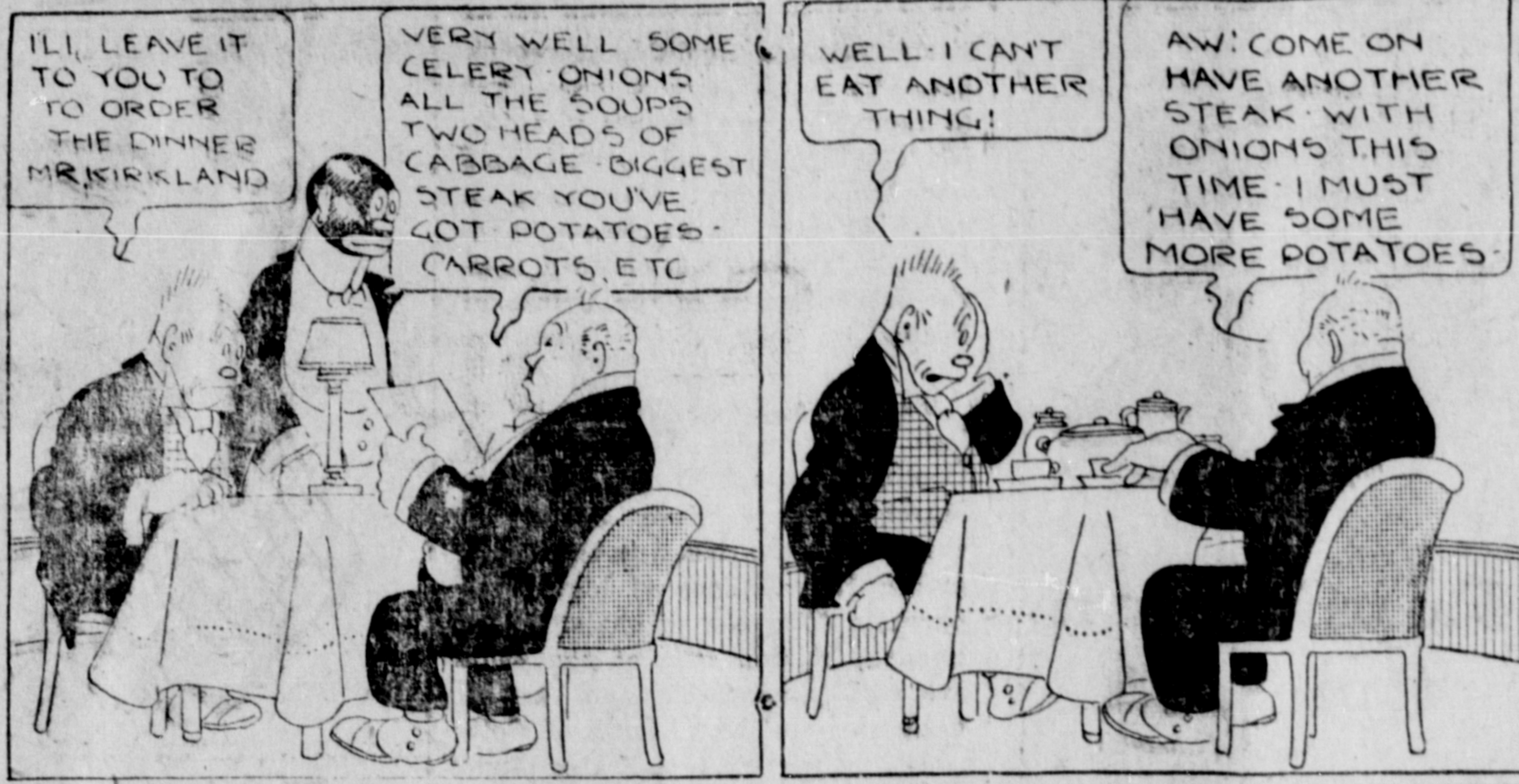
Made Great Impression Here and Was Lunched by Citizens at Hotel Prince Rupert

Newman Erb, whose death is announced today, was a spectacular figure for a short time at Prince Rupert. He was lunched by citizens here at the Prince Rupert Hotel and at that time stated he was going to make this a great port as the shipyard was to be permanent, he had secured promises of further contracts and he was interested in getting a steamship line to operate from this port to the Orient.

Mr. Erb obtained a lease on the local dry dock towards the end of the war for the purpose of building two freighters, the Canadian Scottish and Canadian Britisher, for the Canadian government. After the work had been in progress for some time, but before the ships were completed, the concern got into financial difficulties and assigned in favor of the creditors. The contracts were turned over to the Wallace Shipbuilding Co. of Vancouver which completed the boats. Mr. Erb visited the city on several occasions in connection with the work, travelling over the C.N.R. in his private car from the Ann Arbor road.

The late Mr. Erb was born in Brestlau, Germany, and came to America at the age of three

years. He was educated in St. Louis and was admitted to the bar in 1872. He practised until 1902 when he became actively identified with American rail-roading concerns. He was president of several large companies, including the Western Telegraph Co. and was also active in railway building in the United States. His home was at 140 West 58th St., New York and his office at 42 Broadway in that city.

# AIR RACES IN NEAR FUTURE

Many Trophies Offered for Competition During Summer and Autumn

WASHINGTON, Mar. 25.—Aviation events in the United States and abroad this year, as listed by the National Aeronautic Association, will keep sportsmen in this field well occupied. The National Championship Balloon Race, to be held May 1, at St. Joseph, Mo., will be an elimination contest to decide American competitors for the second Gordon Bennett Cup race at Brussels, June 7. The original Gordon Bennett Cup race was inaugurated in 1906, the American selective race being started in 1909. The winning team in the American National Championship balloon race will be awarded the Litchfield trophy. Entries for the Jacques Schneider Maritime trophy contest at Baltimore, Md., October 24-31, the international seaplane speed contest, close April 1. England was forced out of this race last year because of an accident to its entry, and Italy withdrew, but both have announced their intention to enter this year.
