MISS ORFORD IS DISMISSED

Girl Who Made Confession Regarding Janet Smith Murder Loses Job

WILL GIVE EVIDENCE

Says She Will Tell all She Knows When The Proper Time Comes

VANCOUVER, July 18.—Relieved of her appointment by the Designer Publishing Company of Toronto, for whom she was working in a local department store, Barbara Orford, star witness for the defence in the criminal libel charge against J. Sedgwick Cowper of The Saturday Tribune, and whose alleged "confession" in connection with the Janet K. Smith mystery slaying led to the libel charge and aroused a furor of excitement in police circles, stated that an attempt was being made to force her to leave the town before giving her testimony.

"They couldn't buy me to get out, and they couldn't scare me out; now they are trying to starve me out, but they will not succeed," the girl declared after exhibiting a telegram from Toronto which intimated that she had lost her position.

"Must request your resignation to take immediate effect," is the bald announcement in the telegram, but Miss Orford declares it has been engineered from this end. She refuses, however, to say who is behind the attempt to make her leave Vancouver, or give further information as to the attempts which she alleges had been made previously to get her to go.

"I'll tell everything I know at the proper time," she said. "This has only made me more determined than ever."

Many soccer fans are saying that the real battle for the Dominion Day Cup this year will be fought tonight when the Callies and Sons of England meet in the first round to decide who will go to the final on July 1 with the Great War Veterans. The Callies, if performances so far this season may be taken as indication, seem to have about the strongest aggregation of soccerists in town and the Sons of England have been the only ones that have been causing them much worry. The fact that these two teams are meeting tonight will ensure a good game which will doubtless be attended by all enthusiastic football fans in town. The Callies have yet to be beaten this season though the Sons of England played them to a draw once in the Stuart Shield series.

After a thorough study of the plans and photographs presented to him, George S.
