MAYOR SPEAKS TO RATEPAYERS

Addresses Association on Question of Filling Cow Bay and Other Matters

His remarks being principally in connection with the project for the filling in of Cow Bay for the privilege of doing which the provincial government intends to turn over to the city 200 feet of waterfrontage, Mayor re-elected S. M. Newton addressed the Prince Rupert Ratepayers' Association last night. The meeting was presided over by Vice-president M. M. Stephens and there was a fair attendance of members of the association.

In connection with the final settlement of this proposal, which had been approved by the electors, Mayor Newton said that the Ratepayers' Association might give valuable assistance. The proposal was that the city should receive 200 feet of waterfrontage just east of the mouth of Cow Bay in return for giving permission to the filling up of the bay. It would be the intention of the city on the waterfrontage it thus received to provide landing and shelter for vessels of fishermen and people from outside points along the coast. After denying the suggestion that in advancing the proposition he had been serving any interests, Mayor Newton entered into an account of the steps that had led up to the plebiscite being presented. There was still a feeling that a mistake might be made in permitting the filling up of Cow Bay for fear that it would be impossible to obtain any other adequate shelter. However, he could see no other course open if the desired facilities for the landing and shelter of small boats was to be obtained. This was a matter, he felt, that should have been attended to long ago as a matter of keeping faith with the fishing interests. It would benefit the city, he felt, in the competition to make this the headquarters of the fishing industry of the Pacific Coast.

Extols Association
 In the course of his address, the mayor reiterated former statements he had made regarding the value of the Ratepayers' Association to the city. Through suggestions and assistance given the city council last year, he felt it had demonstrated its usefulness which he hoped would be continued. Any complaints or suggestions it had to make would always be welcomed and given full consideration by the council.

Mr. Stephens having congratulated Mayor Newton on his re-election, Mayor Newton reciprocated the sentiments of Ald. Elce Stephens and stated his hope that the 1925 council would so measure up to its responsibilities and requirements that, when the end of the year arrived, the association could not but feel that the best courses had been followed in the interests of the citizens generally.

The question of the removal of the plank roadway on Tate Street again having been brought up, Mayor Newton stated that it had been decided to extend grading to Section 2 to take in this street if the property owners involved so desired.

Seventh Avenue Water
 In answer to remarks by D. B. McDougall respecting the advisability of enlarging the water main on Seventh Avenue West, His Worship stated that he had brought this matter to the attention of the city council and it would be dealt with by the new board of works.

OBJECTS TO METHOD OF DEBT COLLECTING

At the meeting of the hospital board last night J. J. Gillis objected to the methods being used to collect debts for the General Hospital. He owed a small amount and the account had been placed for collection with a foreign collecting agency. Alderman Macdonald suggested that for a man with seven children and employment not very regular some leniency should have been shown. He defended the action of the secretary, who was working under instructions. He did not like the method of securing the aid of a foreign agency to collect debts. Mr. Mackay defended the method, saying that an interna-

tional organization could be more effective than a purely national one. Even their unions were international. However he thought the members of the Board should authorize such a matter as this.
