## SAVING SOULS RADIO ROUTE

Well Known Preacher Tells of Wide Appeal Through Broadcasting

### GIVES SPECIFIC CASES

Ordinary Minister Works Congregation Over Like Taffy-Pulling Machine

After a year's experience preaching over radio, through remote control lines of KGO, the General Electric Pacific Coast Station, Dr. James L. Gordon, widely known minister of the First Congregational Church, San Francisco, today gave his opinion that radio is changing the system of saving souls.

According to Dr. Gordon, pre-radio ideas of assembling people in a building to preach to them en masse, bearing in mind crowd psychology, is giving away under radio influence to the new technique of selling the Gospel to millions of individuals, each with a different kind of mind.

Although his church is centrally located in the city of San Francisco, he says: "Only about 8,000 people pass through our doors each week. All we could do, before the coming of KGO's radio things in my pulpit, was to work this crowd over and over again, week after week, like that taffy-pulling machine in the window."

### Hundreds of Miles

"With radio, things are different. Radio reaches hundreds of miles from my pulpit. A 13 year old boy, 500 miles from here, wrote me a letter the other day in response to one of my Sunday morning sermons," continued Dr. Gordon. "This boy had just completed a radio and had it out in the barn, listening in, with his dog 'Nellie.' The boy's father was there, too, listening. During my sermon I happened to mention my little dog, 'Nellie,' and her death. Mention of my dog's death, when associated in this boy's mind with his own pet, somehow awakened bitter memories. Boy and father wept together. It was explained on the tear-stained page of his letter—only a few weeks before 'Mother' had died. Right there, maybe for the first time in their lives, that boy and his father confessed to each other spiritual understanding."

ity, Soul, Spirit, it seems to lift them harder than 'jazz' ever does. This sort of talk over an unseen, mysterious line, is uncanny, and seems spiritual itself. If I should happen to remark in front of a radio: 'What you are about to do will be remembered,' it might have but little effect on my congregation in the church. But how about a bootlegger listening in, all ready to start on a cruise in his bottle-laden 'flyver'; or maybe a bank clerk hatching up in his mind \$10,000 worth of sin and trouble; or a man and wife engaged in a family row—would they not be affected, hearing that mysterious voice out of somewhere, saying: 'What you are about to do will be remembered?' Smiling, Dr. Gordon continued: 'You'd think they'd turn it off. Well, some of them do, but most of them, I believe, just can't resist that mysterious little box over in the corner telling them things.'

### Crusade Against Devil

Crusading against the devil and his work is helped by music played during a church service broadcast, according to Dr. Gordon. "Sometimes we have a colored brother come in and sing the old songs, like 'Carry Me Back to Old Virginia.' We also use in our radio services old tunes played on cabinet organs a generation ago. This sort of music awakens old memories. I know one instance," continued this modern minister, "where radio music from our church was a comfort to the dying. A man in a hospital lay dying with pneumonia, unconscious of the radio things on his ears, such as all the patients in the ward had available. Suddenly he began to sing, 'Abide With Me,' the hymn which we were broadcasting. A doctor there wrote me about it. He said the dying man's face was transfigured for an instant as he gasped his last words — 'they are all singing—they are all singing—all singing together.'

### Ghostly Atmosphere

"I have never yet seen an audience remain indifferent to this ghostly, mysterious atmosphere of radio in a church. When we broadcast over KGO I notice everybody in my congregation sings with a little more spirit. They're thinking of all the people listening in. And, when I'm broadcasting, no matter what platitude I may utter my audience gives me strict attention. We preachers are also affected by this strange force. We can't help but change a little when we broadcast. With the world listening in, we are afraid to be too dogmatic."

"But we know very little about how to best use this power. Some day the real radio preacher will appear. He will be a master of the technique of preaching to millions of individuals, not in a crowd, but scattered over the earth. He will have to advance a philosophy with its background in God, and deal with truths acceptable to all. If I were younger," continued this preacher who looks and talks like Lloyd George, "I'd go in for radio sermons on a big scale. The young man who masters preaching with radio in his pulpit, will be as famous there as Arthur Brisbane is now famous on the front page of a newspaper."

## LAUNDRIES DECLARE FOR THE NEWSPAPERS ADVERTISING MEDIUM

REGINA, June 3. — Truthful advertising will sell anything with merit and the best medium for advertising is the daily newspaper was one of the outstanding statements made before the North West Canadian Laundrymen's Association annual convention in Regina by W. Mr. Johnson stressed the value of newspaper advertising and quoted his own experience in Galveston and showed the delegates the advertising campaign which he had carried on with most successful results. He attributes a sixteen per cent increase in business largely to truthful advertising and organization of sales force to back it up. A definite policy of devoting two per cent of the previous year's profits to advertising had been followed and the results were excellent. He assured the laundrymen that it was one of the surest methods which they could use which would bring them volume of business, but aggressive salesmanship had to be coupled with it and instances of what other industries were doing through use of newspaper space and sales forces.
