Situation in China is Grave and British and American Governments Are Sending Reinforcements There

Two Thousand British Bluejackets Landed at LOOKS BAD FOR Shanghai and more to follow; Trouble is Spreading

LONDON, June 4.—A very grave view is taken here of disurbances in Shanghai and the outlook in China generally is iscouraging. Fears are being expressed that things are movng toward a situation resembling the Boxer uprising.

It is announced officially that the government is taking all ecessary steps to safeguard British subjects. The Admiralty tated that 2,000 bluejackets had been landed at Shanghai and hese would be reinforced. A number of gunboats were expect-
