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Washington Nurse Travels World as Roving Reporter

MONTREAL (CP)—Isadore Denike might be called a roving reporter, but she's as much at home with bandages and medicine as with paper and type-writer. She's a public health specialist from Washington, D.C.

Miss Denike's assignment is to tour as much of the world as she can, learning about health systems and methods and reporting back to the American Nurses Association.

She is director of Student Health Services at Freedman's Hospital in Washington, and has a master's degree from the University of Minnesota.

Whenever she comes across an idea that could be used back home, out comes the typewriter and off goes a report to Washington. She has already visited Mexico, Spain, Germany, England and France.

At present she is taking a look at the way Canadians approach health problems. She says Canadians do things "much the same as at home." Even the top 10 fatal diseases in Canada are the same as those in the United States.

But she has found that standards of public nursing differ widely from country to country. Sanitation in Mexico is still primitive, she says. In Britain they are as up-to-date as anywhere, with maternity work especially well advanced, but there tradition is still over-emphasized, she thinks.

Britain, however, has a lower infant death rate than Canada or the United States, she said, because there nurses are trained as midwives and there is an active program of pre-natal care for all prospective mothers.

Craftsmen Busy Making Tiaras For Coronation

LONDON (CP)—British jewelry designers are fashioning tiaras and magnificent jewelry suites for formal wear, to be worn in Westminster Abbey at the Coronation next June and on other state occasions in connection with the crowning of Queen Elizabeth.

The Coronation is also responsible for preparation of many designs with a coronation motif to be sold at home and abroad as symbols and souvenirs.

Pearls and diamonds are combined to make some unusual tiaras. One London jeweller has designed a tiara on a base of three rows of pearls, with the addition of larger pearls and diamonds. This one is very light and can be worn comfortably for long periods.

PLATINUM FAVORED
The modern tiaras are set in platinum, in contrast to older designs that were always in gold or silver. Lacy designs seen at previous coronations are also out of date. Fringe and sun-ray fashions now are fashionable.

One London jeweller is producing tiaras with a dual purpose. They may be converted in a few minutes to be worn at diamond necklaces. In turn, the necklace can be split into a double clip and earrings.

The crown motif of course is a favorite one for costume jewelry to be sold in Britain during the coronation year. Crown brooches worn on the lapel of a jacket, or even in the hair, will be in pearls or rhinestones.

Among coronation souvenirs silver will be used for tiny hairbrushes, cocktail sticks, tankards and sauce boats. For children there will be silver pranglers with a fleur-de-lis design, and hair brushes decorated with miniature crowns.

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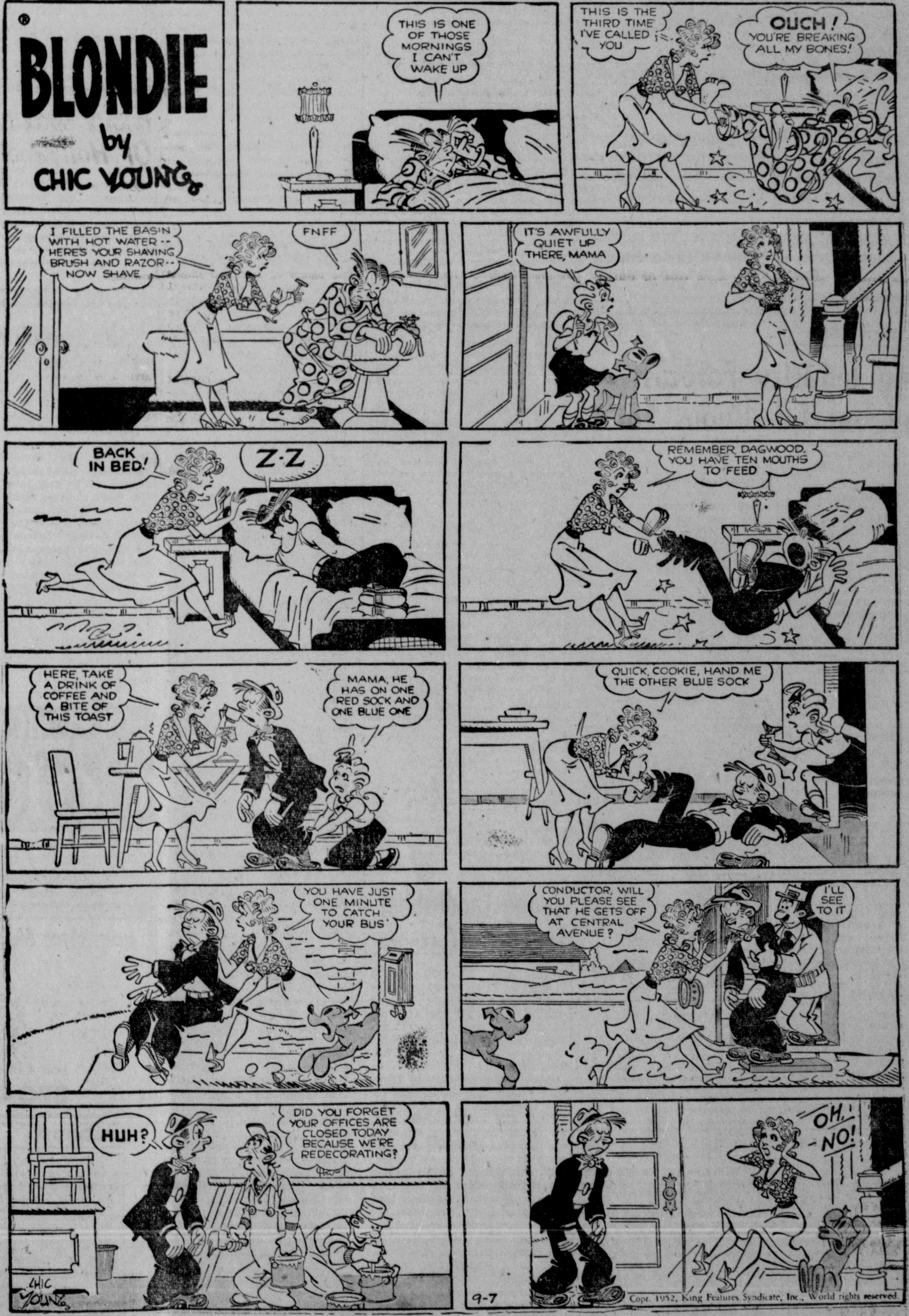
