C.P.R. steamer Princess Beatrice, Capt. J. Glille, arrived from the south at 2 o'clock this morning and at 11 o'clock cleared on her return to Vancouver.

C.N.R. steamer Prince John Capt. E. Mabbis, is expected tomorrow night from Vancouver via the Queen Charlotte Islands. The vessel left Vancouver on Monday—two days late.

Peter Ryan of Metlakatla and Arthur Lewis of Kitkalla, both natives, were charged in the city police court this morning with intoxication. They pleaded guilty and were remanded until this afternoon.

Mrs. Fred S. Gale, who has been here for the past month on account of the serious illness of her husband which resulted in his death at the hospital this week, sailed this morning by the Princess Beatrice on her return to Swanson Bay.

Southbound from Skagway to Vancouver, C.P.R. steamer Princess Mary, Capt. C. C. Staintey, was in port from 2 to 2:30 this afternoon. The vessel was delayed on account of stormy weather in the north and is about 24 hours behind schedule.


