(Special to Daily News). OTTAWA, Feb. 28. Robert Jones, railway engineer, has nine were Canadian. They sold rwarded his recommendation to Hon. Charles Stewart that for the low average price of outlet from the Peace River country to the Pacific coast ould be by way of Monkman Pass. His reasons are that it were: the shortest and cheapest.

Jones made the report at the instance of the minister of interior and has forwarded it to Ottawa with plans, profiles

estimates of cost of such a line. The proposed line would start from Grande Prairie and oceed along the Monkman Pass to Hansard on the main line of Canadian National Railway and from there to Prince Rupert er the present track.

The outlet to Vancouver would be by either using the Paci-Great Eastern or doubling back to Redpass Junction and godown the main line of the Canadian National.

The distance to Vancouver by the Monkman Pass route 76 miles shorter than by any other line. It is estimated by engineer to cost \$9,000,000 and the McLellan-Brule line 2,000,000, while the Pine Pass route would cost \$14,000,000.

Mr. Stewart came out flat-footed in favor of Monkman is route today. "The cost would be a big factor in the enprise and the route by Monkman Pass is the least expensive," minister pointed out. "In addition it meets all the requirents of the situation. If we adopt this plan, development will ne about more quickly than by the other scheme."

Hansard is 45 miles east of Prince George and 513 miles Prince Rupert.

Red Pass Junction is 163.9 miles east of Hansard so trains ng to Vancouver would have that distance to double back. Monkman Pass has been very little in the public eye unlast summer when it was announced that the pass with an y gradient and direct route had been discovered. 

BERLIN, Feb. 28 .- Friederich Ebert, first president of the German republic, died at 10.15 this morning of peritonitis, following an operation for appendicitis five days ago.

The president was formerly a saddlemaker. His skill has been shown in guiding the infant republic through the troublesome years of its existence and which is acknowledged by its bitterest enemies to have made a gallant fight for life.

President Ebert was first taken ill Monday night and following an operation the doctors believed the danger was past, but the patient failed to rally and passed away this morning.
