Good Type of Men  
In Political Life.

The nomination of George Bushby as candidate to contest this seat on behalf of the Conservatives at the next Federal election is another evidence of the trend of the times to nominate men of the best type for positions in public life. Stayed With Job  
For Many Years.

It seems so unusual for a man to stay with his job for many years in this country that when it does occur it is worthy of note. Recently there was a printer died in Winnipeg, Arthur Judd, who had been connected with the mechanical department of the Manitoba Free Press for forty years. For 25 years of that time he was foreman in the composing room.

Forty years is a long time to be with one firm in Canada. He must have seen the paper grow up from very small proportions to the fine sheet it is today. Incidentally it may be mentioned that Mr. Judd was an Ontario man.

Is Woman Liability  
To Man During Life?

The question is discussed in a current magazine whether a person marrying is incurring a liability. Is woman a liability to a man or an asset?

In spite of all the arguments to the contrary it may be laid down as an axiom that two cannot live as cheaply as one. In that respect, perhaps, woman is a liability. It is not in that sense, however, that the question is raised. What it is aimed to find out is whether woman helps a man in his life work or is a drag upon him.

Of course it all depends on the woman. Some women have no sympathy with the aims and aspirations of a man and do everything possible to discourage him. That was true of the wife of John Wesley, the founder of Methodism. It is said of her that she would sit at the back of the church and make faces at her husband while he was preaching. She ridiculed him and put stumbling blocks in his way whenever possible.

Yet anyone who has friends must know of cases where the woman is an inspiration to the man, encouraging him in his work, sympathizing with him in his failures and strengthening him in his resolves. So much depends upon the woman. Even in the case of Wesley, his wife probably helped him, as the failure of his home life turned his mind wholly to the task he had in hand.

To Forget Work.

Sometimes we do not attend to business closely enough and then again we do not play well enough. Today everyone is thinking of play rather than work, for there is a big holiday Monday when almost all people get away from the routine task in which they are engaged.

LORD FRENCH  
AND HIS WORK

Famous General Had Difficult  
Position in France and Later  
in Ireland

The Earl of Ypres, formerly Field Marshal Viscount French, Lord Lieutenant and Governor General of Ireland, relinquished command of the British forces in France and Flanders to Field Marshal Sir Douglas Haig in December 1915, after 16 months of warfare with the Germans. Until then he had been termed "the luckiest man in the British army."

Outnumbered by the enemy and short of high explosives needed to halt their advance, he had handled the sorely tried British army in a masterly way in its strategic retreat from Mons. A few weeks later, with nearly 4,000,000 men, he fought the historic battle of Ypres, the winning of which barred the Channel ports from the Germans and saved England from invasion. It was at Ypres that the Germans first resorted to their deadly asphyxiating gas attacks.

"The glorious troops under my command had gone valiantly to their death," Field Marshal French wrote, "when a few more guns and a few more shells would have many times saved their sacrifice. And still no sufficient supplies came." Criticized at home for permitting the Germans almost impregnable to entrench themselves, the Field Marshal became engaged in a controversy with his old South African commander, Lord Kitchener, then Secretary of State for War.

Kitchener's Burden

Lord Northcliffe of the London Times had gone to the British front and, upon his return, bluntly told the facts of the shell shortage. Kitchener, "for almost 10 months head of the British War Office with a free hand and absolute control," was shown to be bearing a burden too much for any one man. Parliament passed a bill creating the Ministry of Munitions and David Lloyd George, then Chancellor of the Exchequer, took the new post in the incoming coalition government. It was Lloyd George's eloquence that awakened the shop workers of Great Britain to a realization of their country's peril, resulted in a tremendous output of shells and other war implements, and ultimately made the Welsh statesman Premier. Lord Kitchener, his burdens lightened but still Secretary of State for War, started on a diplomatic and military mission to Russia. He perished at sea when the warship conveying him struck a mine and sank with all hands aboard.

To revert to French's "luck," he was 41 years old and a half-pay Colonel on the retired list in 1893. He had been shelved to give younger officers a chance. In 1895 the British military authorities decided to revise their cavalry drill book. Sir George Luck, then Inspector of Cavalry, under whom French had served in India, chose him to write the new regulations. It was a success. French was made Assistant Adjutant General of Cavalry and thereupon headed direct for the command of the "first hundred thousand" British soldiers who met the first terrific German onslaughts. Meanwhile he had won distinction as a cavalry leader in the Boer War for which he was knighted and given a Lieutenant Generalcy. For two years before the outbreak of the World War he was chief of the British Imperial Staff.

Ulster Trouble

In March, 1914, there had been trouble in Ulster over the organization of Sir Edward Carson's "volunteer army" opposed to Home Rule. Troops at the Curragh camp had been ordered to Belfast and a number of officers had resigned. General Paget, in command, urged the government that officers with family connections in Ulster should not be sent there. Lord French had signed a memorandum, agreeing to Paget's request and the government repudiated the document as permitting "optional obedience" whereupon numerous British army officers, including Colonel Seely, then Secretary of War, and General French, resigned as chief of staff. Premier Asquith assumed the added duties of the War Department. The Irish political situation, however, underwent a change and many of the officers, including

General French, withdrew their resignations.

Upon his retirement as Commander-in-Chief of the British forces in France and Flanders, Field Marshal French was created a Viscount and designated as Commander-in-Chief of the armies of the United Kingdom. He served in this capacity until May 11, 1918, when he was made Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, much to the surprise of the Irish Nationalists who expressed the belief that Lord French's administration would be characterized by repressive measures. On December 19, 1919, when the Lieutenant General was motoring in Ireland, an attempt was made to assassinate him. His car was ambushed and fired upon but he escaped injury.

Student of Napoleon

Field Marshal French was a great student of Napoleon, the soldier, and believed him the greatest strategist the world ever knew. In following out Napoleon's campaigns in detail he personally covered and studied much of the very ground in Belgium over which, years later, he was to combat as formidable a foe as the Little Corporal faced at Waterloo. His favorite authors were Dickens and Thackeray and his favorite books "Bleak House" and "The Book of Snobs."

He was of Irish descent, born in 1852 and the son of a British navy captain. For four years the future head of the British army was a naval cadet and midshipman but abandoned the Royal Navy to enter the army of which he later became the Commander-in-Chief.

AIRPLANE FOR  
SEAL HUNTING

Flyer Going North From Here Spent Winter in Newfoundland on Interesting Work

C. S. Caldwell, who will go north from here as mechanic on the Vickers Viking flying boat taking Archibald Little, Detroit mining engineer, to the Cassiar gold fields, came to the city from Newfoundland. During the winter he was piloting an airplane used by sealing vessels for locating their catches in northern Atlantic waters.

The machine, used in this work, is of the type known as a Baby Avro. Moored to the sealing ship, it is slid off onto the ice from which it takes off and lands, the machine having skids instead of pontoons or landing wheels. Of a diminutive size, the Baby Avro has a wing spread of thirty feet, is propelled by an 80 horse-power rotary motor and carries two persons.

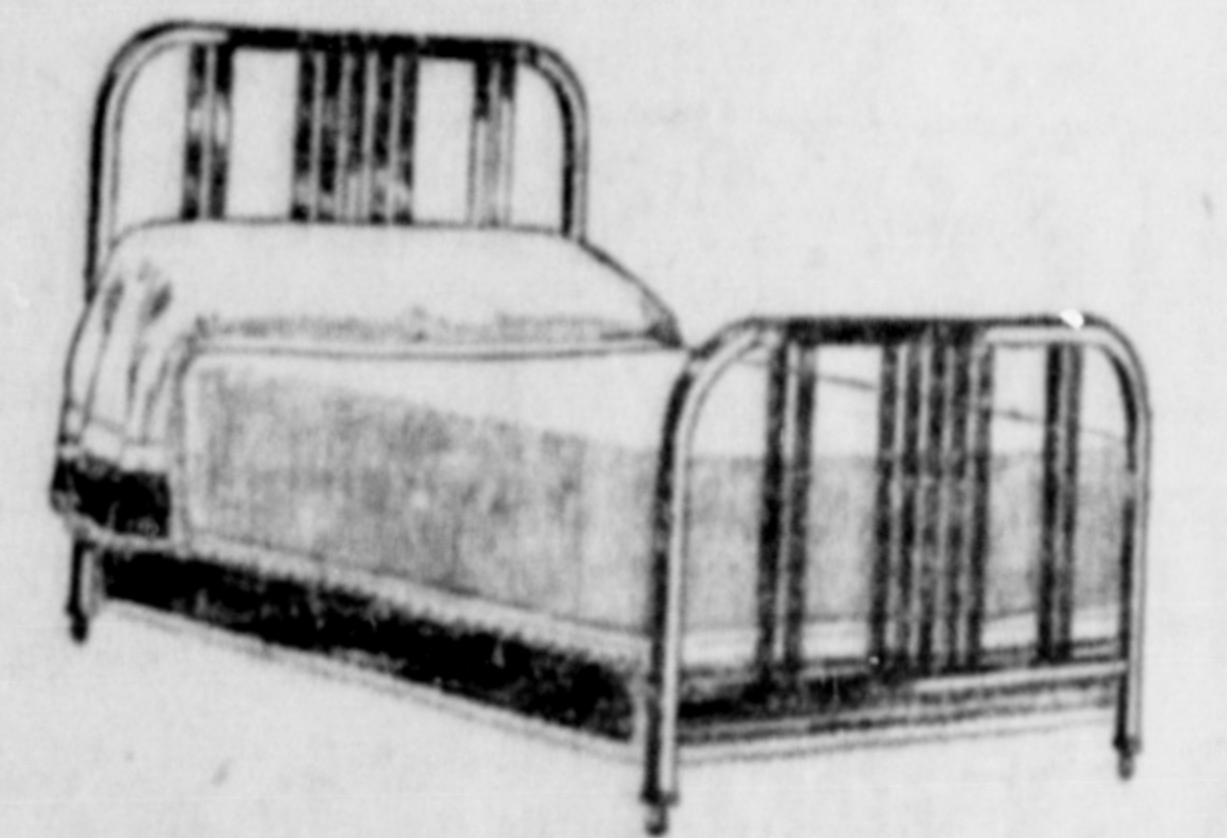
