## PROTEST MADE U.S. SEIZURE

**Claim Made That Pescawha Went to Rescue of Ship-wrecked Men Only**

Not only are local shipping men up in arms against seizure of the Victoria rum-runner Pescawha, but rescued members of the steam schooner Caboo have voiced their sentiments regarding the seizure made by the United States coastguard cutter Algonquin, as the trial of Captain Pamphlet and his crew approaches, says the Victoria Colonist.

It will be remembered that the rum runner Pescawha picked up distress signals from the Caboo, when she had sprung a leak and was sinking off the Columbia River, and that the crew had to sea in two small boats. Venturing inside the twelve-mile limit, Captain Pamphlet and members of his crew rescued nine members of the Caboo, after they had struggled for forty-eight hours in wallowing seas

that threatened to sink them any minute. The coastguard cutter Algonquin sighted the Pescawha shortly after that vessel had picked up the crew and seized her as a rum-runner inside the twelve-mile limit.

arrest of its officers, and they are in jail awaiting prosecution.

### Refused to Answer

"American ships passed us and refused to answer our signals," Fairfield said, "and we would have drowned for sure, if the Pescawha hadn't come to our rescue."

"We drifted for about forty-eight hours, used up all our signals and were ready to give up when Captain Pamphlet came.

"We were all soaked to the hide. Our cat had jumped from the lifeboat into the ocean, and with a sailor's superstition, we expected the worst. One more night and we would have died from exposure, and we knew it. Then along towards 4 o'clock the Pescawha came to us.

"The captain took us aboard, gave us dry clothes, plenty of hot coffee and food.

"I even slept in his berth. They couldn't have done any more than they did for us, yet they knew they were running a big risk.

"When the Algonquin finally reached them and arrested the officers, they refused to comment. 'I'd do the same thing over again,' Captain Pamphlet said.

"I know this rum-running's dangerous business, but men like these aren't born every minute."

### Take Exception

Exception was taken to this seizure inasmuch that the Canadian vessel had endangered itself in venturing within the twelve-mile limit to rescue American sailors from an American ship, after an American liner had passed one of the small boats by, the one which the Pescawha rescued, despite the fact that the crew even unrolled their sails to signal the liner.

Appreciation of the heroic scene was shown in a presentation made on behalf of the Sudden & Christenson Company, which owned the vessel. Captain Ernest G. Heinrich, of the Columbia Pacific Shipping Company's staff, made the presentation of a watch to Captain Pamphlet and gave an address to the members of the Pescawha crew in appreciation of their heroic efforts.

Daniel Fairfield, second assistant engineer of the steam schooner Caboo, who was one of the nine men rescued by the Pescawha crew, tells of his night in the ocean, when nine thoroughly exhausted men, prepared for death, were saved by the Pescawha seamen.

The rescue brought the Pescawha in, in view of the Algonquin, led to its confiscation and the
