## GOVERNOR WAS AT SMITHERS

Left Train at Telkwa and Drove Through Valley to Divisional Point.

### Visited Lake Kathlyn.

SMITHERS, June 29.—The citizens of Smithers had as their guests for a couple of hours on Friday morning Lord and Lady Byng and party, who stopped off here while on their tour through northern B. C.

Lord Byng had accepted the invitation of the Smithers council to motor over from Telkwa to here, and he and his party were met at that town and brought over in two cars driven by Billy Orchard and Robert Barnett and thus were enabled to get a different impression of the possibilities of this valley from that obtained when just travelling through by rail.

The party arrived at Smithers about 10:15 and were met and welcomed by Mayor Orchard, and the citizens en masse at Alfred Park.

After the official welcome, Lord Byng inspected the Boy Scouts who had turned out in full force to greet him as also had the school children who were drawn up in two long lines on the green. The citizens were each greeted personally by Lord and Lady Byng. His Lordship seemed especially pleased to shake hands with the war veterans, and made inquiries in most cases regarding their services. He found many men who had served under him on the battle-fields and one had been in his regiment when he was a colonel in the Boer war.

While Lord Byng was the guest of the G.W.V.A. members at their club, Lady Byng motored down to Lake Kathlyn with Mrs. Orchard to view the beautiful scenery of the Hudson's Bay Mountain with its glaciers.

Before leaving, Lord Byng complimented Major Gale, president of the G.W.V.A. on their club rooms, saying they were the most pleasant he had yet seen in B. C., in fact he considered they compared in this respect with any in the Dominion.

## FOREST FIRES NEAR SMITHERS

One Started At Lake Kathlyn And Swept Westward Along Railway.

SMITHERS, June 29.—The hot dry weather of the past two weeks has again made the risk of forest fires an active question and there are now several burning in the valley.

The fire causing the most damage started at noon Friday close to Chas. Wilson's farm at Lake Kathlyn and was soon sweeping westward along both sides of the railway before a strong wind, and throwing up dense clouds of smoke.

The forestry officials put all their force on this fire and conscripted every spare man in the district and by Saturday evening had it pretty well under control.

In the first 12 hours the red demon had burned over a tract of land one mile wide and five miles long, and was at Toboggan Lake, two or three settlers were forced to flee from its path.

George Ballard and Gust Berg had to leave their farms and it is not yet known what damage has been done as the fire is still too hot for them to venture back to see.

Two small railway bridges were in the fire zone and the crews spent a busy night trying to keep the fire from burning them out.

In the hunt for fire fighters both the local barbers were taken and the men are hoping that the fires will soon be out, otherwise Smithers might be taken for a Bolshevik or Doukhobor settlement.

In the evening a dance was held in the school house which was greatly enjoyed and made a perfect ending to a perfect day.
