SANTA BARBARA, June 29, 2.15 p.m.—Ten million dollars worth of damage, twelve persons known to be dead, and the virtual destruction of most of the business section of State Street are the results of the big earthquake here this morning.



COWPER GOES UP FOR TRIAL

Baker Declared Stories of Party At His House Nothing But Malicious Lies.

ORFORD EVIDENCE OUT

Magistrate Objects to Besmirching Character of Dead Girl Unable to Defend Self.

VANCOUVER, June 29 .- "You are not only throwing mud at Baker but you are besmirching the name of the dead girl who is not here to defend herself," declared Magistrate Findlay this morning in ruling against councel for Cowper putting into evidence statements alleged to have been made by Barbara Orford. After listening to evidence of John A. Norris and Baker, the magistrate decided that Cowper should be committed for trial, but allowed a remand until Thursday to enable Cowper to arrange bail.
